



## Training helps attendees learn how to move conversations "from head to heart"

Communicating across difference was the theme of a train-the-leader event held on October 31 at the Human Services Building.

Nearly 20 DHS staff members from across program and support offices attended the training and participated in a variety of exercises designed to create intentional connection, move interactions from the head to heart, and put differences on the table. Each participant left with a list of ways they could use what they learned to build stronger relationships in the work they do.

The training was offered as part of a year-long Seeding Civity grant DHS received this summer that "offers training and coaching assistance to selected communities interested in deepening work to foster connections across difference." The grant is supported by Civity and Welcoming America.
