 7 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Roll call.  
 8 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?

 41 MR. BARKER: A proclamation congratulating Mr.  
 42 Van Kaplan upon the occasion of his 20th anniversary as  
 43 Executive Producer of the Pittsburgh Civic Light Opera.  
 44 Sponsored by Council Members Baker and DeMarco.  
 45 MR. BAKER: All right. Thanks, Mr. President.

1 WHEREAS, in 2009, Van Kaplan co-founded the  
 2 National High School Musical Theatre Awards, The Jimmy  
 3 Awards, which he directs annually at the Minskoff Theatre.  
 4 These awards were the subject of the 2012 nationally  
 5 televised series "Broadway or Bust," which he co-produced  
 6 with PBS. Prior to The Jimmy Awards, Mr. Kaplan produced  
 7 the acclaimed Pittsburgh CLO's Gene Kelly Awards for  
 8 Excellence in High School Musical Theater for 12 years.  
 9 I know when you talk to Yarone Zober, that's one  
 10 of his best childhood memories, I think, going for the  
 11 Gene Kelly Awards and that's something that I know a lot  
 12 of friends take pride that are involved with theatre and  
 13 have kids in theatre, so that's --- that's great. And the  
 14 Jimmy Awards were named after a colleague who's very well-  
 15 known who passed away at 94 and did some incredible work  
 16 in Van's --- in Van's field.  
 17 WHEREAS, Van Kaplan has consulted for the  
 18 National Endowment for the Arts and has served as adjunct  
 19 professor for CMU, in their MAM Program, Masters of Arts  
 20 Management. He is on the Board of The Broadway League,  
 21 serves on the Investment Committee of the Independent  
 22 Presenters Network and is a past president of The National  
 23 Alliance for Musical Theatre and currently serves on the  
 24 Board. He has been a Tony Awards voter for more than 20  
 25 years.  
 26 So not only does he get a chance to vote in  
 27 district three in Allegheny County, but he also gets a  
 28 chance to vote on the Tony Awards.  
 29 Ed Kress just popped up.  
 30 So he gets to vote locally here, but also for  
 31 the Tony Awards at the --- at the national level.  
 32 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the  
 33 Allegheny County Council does hereby congratulate Van  
 34 Kaplan upon the occasion of his 20th Anniversary as  
 35 Executive Producer of the Pittsburgh CLO, and we thank him  
 36 for enhancing the quality of life in Pittsburgh and  
 37 Allegheny County.  
 38 Sponsored by myself and Councilman DeMarco, and  
 39 presented this 11th day of July, 2017.  
 40 Give a big round of applause for Van Kaplan.  
 41 (Applause.)  
 42 MR. KAPLAN: Well, I'm certainly humbled and  
 43 honored. Thank you so much, Tom.

1 I will have Van Kaplan join us up here.  
 2 Congratulations to Van on his 20th anniversary here in ---  
 3 in Pittsburgh in this role. And I was telling Van before  
 4 we started that the more that you research Van Kaplan and  
 5 learn about his background and his history, just the more  
 6 incredibly impressed you are.  
 7 And I had the nice --- the nice chance to get to  
 8 know Van a couple weeks ago at a luncheon that the --- the  
 9 CLO was --- CLO was hosting An American in Paris. That  
 10 show, they did a great job while I was in town.  
 11 Currently, In the Heights is in town and I'm sure Van can  
 12 tell us a little bit about that.  
 13 But he has just an amazing national presence,  
 14 and in the discussions with him and Randy Vulakovich and  
 15 Yarone Zober, the thought was that even though Van has  
 16 this incredible impression on the country, I --- I was a  
 17 little concerned that maybe the 15 of us didn't know him  
 18 as well as we could or should.  
 19 So I wanted to make sure that we could honor him  
 20 here tonight for 20 great years. By coming to county  
 21 council he has committed to another 20, I believe.  
 22 Is that right, Van?  
 23 MR. KAPLAN: Absolutely.  
 24 MR. BAKER: Okay. Very good.  
 25 So with that, we'll read the proclamation of Van  
 26 Kaplan who's done just some incredible, creative things  
 27 here in our community and across the country.  
 28 WHEREAS, Van Kaplan joined the Pittsburgh CLO in  
 29 1997, and this year, marks his 20th anniversary as the  
 30 Executive Producer of the Pittsburgh CLO; and  
 31 WHEREAS, Van Kaplan has produced or co-produced  
 32 the Broadway productions of Evita, Catch Me If You Can,  
 33 Come Fly Away, The Addams Family, and An American in  
 34 Paris, together garnering more than 20 Tony Awards. He  
 35 has also produced more than 10 National Touring  
 36 productions; and  
 37 WHEREAS, An American in Paris is the first  
 38 musical Van Kaplan and the Pittsburgh CLO has originated  
 39 for Broadway. After debuting in Paris, France on December  
 40 10th, 2014, the Broadway production opened at the Palace  
 41 Theatre in New York on April 12, 2015. It garnered four  
 42 Tony Awards and ran for over 600 performances. The  
 43 National tour launched in Boston in October 2016 and the  
 44 London production opened March 2017 at the Dominion  
 45 Theatre; and

1 I --- I just want to say how much --- how much  
 2 joy it is to --- to do what we do here in --- in  
 3 Pittsburgh.  
 4 200,000 people attend our shows every year and I  
 5 guess over 20 years, that's four million people. And when  
 6 you --- when you add up all of the shows that we've done  
 7 on Broadway and the national tours that we've sent out  
 8 from Pittsburgh, it's --- it's quite a lot of people that  
 9 we have touched. And we've touched their lives in a  
 10 meaningful way, kind of bringing the arts in --- into ---  
 11 into the present.  
 12 We have a great theatre school in --- here in  
 13 Pittsburgh, and about 800 students go through our school  
 14 every year, and it's making a meaningful difference in  
 15 young peoples' lives.  
 16 So it's been a joy and an honor for me to serve  
 17 the CLO for 20 years, and our community, and I thank you  
 18 for recognizing that.  
 19 (Applause.)  
 20 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yeah. Come up front.

 15 MR BARKER Motion of the Council of Allegheny  
 16 County urging the administration at the University of  
 17 Pittsburgh should pledge to remain neutral with respect to  
 18 the faculty and graduate employees free exercise of their  
 19 right to form unions, and to refrain from undertaking any  
 20 activities, including but not limited to, the use of  
 21 public funds or tuition dollars, to in any way impede or  
 22 in any other way influence the ability of graduate  
 23 employees and/or faculty to engage in free and open  
 24 dialogue about their collective bargaining rights.  
 25 Sponsored by Council Member Walton  
 26 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO Representative Walton, do  
 27 you want to ---?  
 28 MR WALTON Thank you, Mr President  
 29 This resolution is not an attack on the  
 30 administration of the University of Pittsburgh, but a  
 31 simple request to ask them to comply with the National  
 32 Labor Relations Act.  
 33 There's an organizing campaign that is going on,  
 34 conducted by the United Steel Workers. They organize the  
 35 adjunct faculty at the University of Pittsburgh and its  
 36 associated campuses. And we're just asking the chancellor  
 37 to comply with the law, to not engage in union-busting or  
 38 nefarious activity at all  
 39 We believe that it is the right of any employee  
 40 to organize in the collective --- and to bargain  
 41 collectively. And we're just asking the University of  
 42 Pittsburgh to engage in neutrality and simply put, because  
 43 if that's the case, then those employees, that adjunct  
 44 faculty will make the right decision, whatever it may be.  
 45 So thank you.

1 I'd like to make a motion that we approve it,  
 2 (Chorus of seconds.)  
 3 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO Under remarks?  
 4 Representative Means?  
 5 MS MEANS This is about the movie. Correct?  
 6 This is ---  
 7 MR DEMARCO Yes, ma'am.  
 8 MS MEANS So I just wanted to share with the  
 9 citizens of the United --- of --- of Allegheny County ---,  
 10 MR KRESS States ---  
 11 MS MEANS The United States, too.  
 12 MR KRESS We're also part of the United  
 13 States, too.  
 14 MS MEANS But this is such a good thing for  
 15 Allegheny County. It's going to be a movie about the  
 16 Titanic and they're going to film it at --- at North Park  
 17 pool and Settler's Cabin. But when they do the filming,  
 18 it will be after hours so the citizens won't be denied  
 19 their time at the pool.  
 20 And of course, they'll be staying here in our  
 21 hotels and buying our food and --- and it will be a  
 22 win-win. And they have all their insurance and they're  
 23 good to go and it's a good project and I'm supporting it.  
 24 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO Okay. Any other remarks?  
 25 Seeing none, we'll take the roll  
 26 MR BARKER Mr Baker?  
 27 MR BAKER Yes  
 28 MR BARKER Mr Catena?  
 29 MR CATENA Yes.  
 30 MR BARKER Mr DeMarco?  
 31 MR DEMARCO Yes.  
 32 MR BARKER Mr. Ellenbogen?  
 33 MR ELLENBOGEN Aye  
 34 MR BARKER Mr Futules?  
 35 MR FUTULES Yes.  
 36 MR BARKER Ms. Kirk?  
 37 MS KIRK Yes.  
 38 MR BARKER Mr Klein?  
 39 MR KLEIN Yes.  
 40 MR BARKER Mr Kress?  
 41 MR KRESS Yes.  
 42 MR BARKER Mr. Martoni?  
 43 DR MARTONI Yes.  
 44 MR BARKER Ms. Means?  
 45 MS MEANS Yes.

1 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: First --- there was ---  
 2 second. Under remarks?  
 3 Sam?  
 4 MR DEMARCO: Mr President, I don't know where  
 5 to begin here. I mean I'm disturbed here.  
 6 I believe that this motion, in and of itself, is  
 7 unethical. We have a colleague on council who is employed  
 8 by United Steel Workers Union. His bio, on the council  
 9 website, says that his responsibilities include increasing  
 10 union membership.  
 11 And here we're taking and trying to co-op this  
 12 body to provide undue influence upon the administration at  
 13 the University of Pittsburgh, and ask them to stifle their  
 14 free speech rights by remaining neutral in something  
 15 that's obviously going to affect them.  
 16 I have some significant concern here, and ---  
 17 you know, I would urge my colleague to withdraw this  
 18 motion.  
 19 When you look at this, all the challenges we  
 20 have out there --- tuition is increasing. Folks are  
 21 complaining that they can't afford to go to college. You  
 22 have a --- a tuition --- or I'm sorry, a student loan  
 23 bubble in excess of \$1 trillion out there. Folks are  
 24 complaining, there's a lot of challenges here.  
 25 None of these people that are working at this  
 26 university are slaves. They have the ability to take  
 27 their talents, their skills and --- to take that anywhere  
 28 else they would like to go.  
 29 We saw with the recent contract the United Steel  
 30 Workers negotiated with Robert Morris that they increased  
 31 the costs of labor by over 20 percent. It will be 29  
 32 percent over the term of the contract.  
 33 Listen, if the faculty --- if the adjunct  
 34 faculty and the graduate students of the University of  
 35 Pittsburgh decide that they want to organize with the  
 36 United Steel Workers Union, God bless them. That's the  
 37 --- their right of association. I don't have a problem  
 38 with any of that.  
 39 What I have a problem with is this body getting  
 40 involved here, and exercising undue influence as a  
 41 government body to try to tell somebody that they should  
 42 do something that is directly going to benefit the  
 43 employer of the member on council who brought this up.

1 This would be like me sponsoring a motion urging  
 2 something in the county to buy office equipment from my  
 3 employer. And I --- and I just think it's --- it's wrong.  
 4 Thank you, Mr. President.  
 5 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Means?  
 6 MS. MEANS: Yes. Listen, the University of ---  
 7 of Pittsburgh has been around the block and they know that  
 8 --- that they need to watch what they say to their  
 9 members. And they --- I'm sure they've hired legal  
 10 counsel and that legal counsel has looked at their  
 11 literature that they're handing out to their members.  
 12 So it's all set in law. They know exactly what  
 13 they can say and it's just --- to --- to the members. And  
 14 they're not going to twist any arms and no one ---  
 15 And --- and in this motion, it's specifically  
 16 stated that they don't want public funds or tuition  
 17 dollars used to conduct anti-union activities, force  
 18 graduate employees or faculty to attend meetings meant to  
 19 pressure them, in any way, from creating a union with  
 20 their colleagues and distribute anti-union literature  
 21 meant to mislead, intimidate university employees from  
 22 choosing to engage in collective action, or threaten the  
 23 security of the employees jobs and funding sources.  
 24 Those are all illegal activities, and I'm sure  
 25 that the university is not going to cross those lines and  
 26 do anything illegal in this conversation.  
 27 And I will be voting no.  
 28 Thank you for recognizing me, Mr. President.  
 29 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative DeWitt? Or  
 30 do you want me ---?  
 31 MR. WALTON: I'll take ---  
 32 MR. FUTULES: I have a few questions.  
 33 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Go ahead, Representative  
 34 Futules.  
 35 MR. FUTULES: Yeah, I just have a quick  
 36 question.  
 37 You --- you just challenged his ability to ---  
 38 to present this.  
 39 I'd like a legal opinion from our solicitor.  
 40 MR. CAMBEST: Well, I think we have a --- a  
 41 couple issues. But the --- the issue of whether or not  
 42 the introduction by the motion of Mr. Walton is a conflict  
 43 of interest on his part, the answer to that is no.  
 44 And the reason, as I understand, he's not going  
 45 to gain any compensation or anything else from this

1 We would --- if this organizing campaign is  
 2 successful, we would --- we would then represent those  
 3 employees in that bargaining union.  
 4 I want to be very clear about my intent, about  
 5 my objective, about what I believe is ethical.  
 6 I respect everyone's right to join a union or  
 7 not join a union. I have my beliefs that it is because of  
 8 the union movement that America has achieved the greatness  
 9 that it has, because it has always made certain that 100  
 10 yards is 100 yards, that fair wages and benefits and  
 11 working conditions are part of the process.  
 12 The --- the National Labor Relations Act,  
 13 Article 8, Section 2, spells out the responsibilities of  
 14 the parties. But far too often, employers violate that  
 15 article and that section. And as a result, you wind up  
 16 having chaos and adverse action.  
 17 While I take umbrage with my colleague's  
 18 comments, it is clear that we are only asking the  
 19 University of Pittsburgh to remain neutral, to not do  
 20 anything, and to allow people to make an unfettered choice  
 21 not to spend tax dollars or tuition dollars to oppose this  
 22 action.  
 23 We're not asking them to engage in anything  
 24 that's illegal, that is unethical or untoward, but to  
 25 comply with the law and to take the moral high ground and  
 26 allow people to make a choice. That's what America is  
 27 about, people having an opportunity to make a fair and  
 28 unfettered choice. Thank you.  
 29 MR. DEMARCO: Mr. Chairman --- President.  
 30 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Wait a minute --- wait.  
 31 Okay. Go ahead. Representative DeMarco then ---  
 32 MR. DEMARCO: Mr. President, if we're going to  
 33 allow folks to make a choice, I believe wholeheartedly in  
 34 allowing them to make a choice.  
 35 But I think while giving free rank to the United  
 36 Steel Workers Union to present their best case to the  
 37 faculty members and the adjunct faculty and to try to sell  
 38 them on their valued proposition and what the union can do  
 39 for them, I also believe in the right of the  
 40 administration to be able to talk to these folks and  
 41 explain to them why they believe it may not be a --- a  
 42 good idea for these folks to unionize.  
 43 And I don't see where it is this body's role to  
 44 get involved in this sort of thing. Where does this stop?  
 45 Are we going to start taking --- offering motions each

1 motion. If they would join a --- if the employees of the  
 2 University of Pittsburgh would join a union, as I  
 3 understand it, there would be no direct benefit to him or  
 4 to his immediate family.  
 5 I understand that, Ms. Means is correct. I  
 6 mean, the law, under the PLRB, states that you can't do  
 7 anything against somebody who wants to form a union. And  
 8 I look at the motion as being --- if you're remaining  
 9 neutral, then you're obviously not taking anti-union  
 10 action. You're not taking an anti --- an animus action  
 11 against the employees or against the employer. In that  
 12 regard, you're remaining neutral.  
 13 Finally, when you get involved in something like  
 14 that, with different --- to your example, Mr. DeMarco, is  
 15 what they call a de minimis action under the ethics law.  
 16 So if you're asking somebody to buy furniture  
 17 from your business, that's not in regard to the  
 18 public-at-large, or what they call a de minimis action.  
 19 So if you're a union member or your daughter is a member  
 20 of a union, and you vote on a contract because of that,  
 21 unless it's a direct conflict for your daughter, that  
 22 vote, you fall under that de minimis action, your --- your  
 23 body of --- of members.  
 24 And so as I understand it, and Mr. Walton can  
 25 tell me if I'm different --- if I'm not correct, is that  
 26 this would have no direct economic benefit to you or any  
 27 of your immediate family as defined under the State Ethics  
 28 Act.  
 29 So I don't think it's an ethics question. The  
 30 body, as a whole, if they don't believe that they should  
 31 get involved, not in an illegal conduct, but --- but  
 32 asking the University of Pittsburgh to remain neutral, you  
 33 should vote no on the motion. But there's no conflict.  
 34 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Walton?  
 35 MR. WALTON: Ms. --- Ms. Kirk has a comment.  
 36 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Go ahead.  
 37 MS. KIRK: I just have a quick question. Would  
 38 the Steel Workers Union be one of the unions involved in  
 39 the ---  
 40 MR. WALTON: Yes.  
 41 MS. KIRK: --- with the Pitt employees?  
 42 MR. WALTON: Yep.  
 43 MS. KIRK: (Indicating.)  
 44 MR. WALTON: Yes.

1 week, at each new company throughout the county that  
 2 someone seeks to unionize?  
 3 I mean, we're growing, from a jobs perspective,  
 4 at the rate of less than one half of one percent. While  
 5 we hear many folks come before us and talk about how great  
 6 the economy is in this city and this region, it's not that  
 7 great.  
 8 We have some big players. We have some tech  
 9 players that are moving here. They're not moving here  
 10 because Pittsburgh is so great from, you know, an economic  
 11 vitality perspective. They're moving here to be close to  
 12 their source of --- of folks, their talent. Like Uber and  
 13 Argo, they moved here to be close to CMU.  
 14 Okay?  
 15 And I'm concerned that we're getting involved in  
 16 these things that are none of our business.  
 17 We've already seen, with the city, when Mayor  
 18 Peduto was on city council, he and Councilman Shields  
 19 passed a --- passed an ordinance banning fracking in the  
 20 city of Pittsburgh.  
 21 Now, no one wanted to frack there. But what  
 22 occurred is every oil and gas company that came to this  
 23 region chose not to locate their headquarters or move into  
 24 the city of Pittsburgh, but instead went to Washington  
 25 County and Southpointe, costing us untold millions of  
 26 dollars of taxpayer money, our restaurants economic  
 27 activity, et cetera.  
 28 I just --- I believe the --- the --- this body's  
 29 duty is to follow what's prescribed in the charter. Our  
 30 business is to pass legislation presented to us by the  
 31 County Executive, initiated by us or citizens. It's to  
 32 vote on capital and operating budgets. It's to take a  
 33 levy taxes and fees.  
 34 I don't believe it's to get involved in  
 35 unionized battles between folks here in Allegheny County,  
 36 and I just think it makes us look bad. And with all due  
 37 respect to my colleague, I'm not looking to --- to file a  
 38 complaint or anything like that. I just think that it  
 39 looks bad.  
 40 And I think, while with all due respect to our  
 41 solicitor, Mr. Cambest, when we start talking about these  
 42 things, I don't know that the average person who may be  
 43 viewing this on television, or who will read about it in  
 44 the newspaper, will pick up on the nuances and understand

1 what you're saying appears to be okay. I still have  
 2 questions about that.  
 3 So thank you very much, Mr. President.  
 4 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Next, was Nick,  
 5 Representative Futules.  
 6 MR. FUTULES: First, I'd like to be added as a  
 7 co-sponsor to this motion and if, by chance, Mr. DeWitt  
 8 Walton were to withdraw himself, I would become the  
 9 primary so there would be no conflict anymore.  
 10 Second of all, with due respect, we do tell  
 11 people what to do here. We just had the smoking bans.  
 12 We've had vaping bans. And just last week, we told people  
 13 you have to blood test your children. We do tell people  
 14 what to do.  
 15 So for us to sit up and say this is none of our  
 16 business, it's a matter of opinion.  
 17 So I'll support this and hopefully we can move  
 18 this along. Thank you.  
 19 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Representative  
 20 Ellenbogen didn't say anything yet.  
 21 MR. ELLENBOGEN: I kind of like when people  
 22 invoke the National Labor Relations Act because if you go  
 23 back in history and you look at it, Franklin Roosevelt  
 24 appointed Congressman Henry Ellenbogen as the Chairman of  
 25 the first National Labor Board, so I kind of have a family  
 26 history of that.  
 27 Chuck and John, do you remember a couple years  
 28 ago, before some of the new folks were here, where we had  
 29 that steel workers --- or that steel business in the Mon  
 30 Valley that was unsafe? And you know, the possibility of  
 31 people dying ---  
 32 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yeah.  
 33 MR. ELLENBOGEN: --- because of the unsafe  
 34 conditions? And we kind of got involved, and they're no  
 35 longer there.  
 36 So I guess the question here --- and I think  
 37 Jack answered it --- in terms of is there any gain by my  
 38 colleague? And --- and I think there's not. So I ask  
 39 myself --- you know, the last ten years I've sat here, I  
 40 sure as heck didn't sit here because of the money, that's  
 41 for sure.  
 42 So I think the question you have to ask  
 43 yourself, do we have a moral obligation to the citizens of  
 44 this county that if we see something, do we say something?

1 (President Defazio taps gavel to call for  
 2 order )  
 3 One meeting ---  
 4 MR. WALTON: I don't get a penny out of this  
 5 deal. My sole motivation, is it the right thing to do?  
 6 And I would support this whether --- if it were  
 7 SEIU, whether it was CWA, whether it was AFSCME.  
 8 The question that we have to ask ourselves, is  
 9 it the right thing to do? I support the building trades.  
 10 I'm not a building trades guy, but I support the building  
 11 trade because it's the right thing to do. It brings  
 12 economic vitality, democracy in the workplace and that's  
 13 all we're trying to do.  
 14 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Let's take the vote.  
 15 Let's take the roll call vote because of the conflict,  
 16 here  
 17 MR. BARKER: Mr. Baker?  
 18 MR. BAKER: No.  
 19 MR. BARKER: Mr. Catena?  
 20 MR. CATENA: Yes.  
 21 MR. BARKER: Mr. DeMarco?  
 22 MR. DEMARCO: No.  
 23 MR. BARKER: Mr. Ellenbogen?  
 24 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Aye.  
 25 MR. BARKER: Mr. Futules?  
 26 MR. FUTULES: Yes.  
 27 MR. BARKER: Ms. Kirk?  
 28 MS. KIRK: No.  
 29 MR. BARKER: Mr. Klein?  
 30 MR. KLEIN: As an employee of the  
 31 University of Pittsburgh, I will abstain.  
 32 MR. BARKER: Mr. Kress?  
 33 MR. KRESS: Yes.  
 34 MR. BARKER: Mr. Macey?  
 35 (No response )  
 36 MR. BARKER: Mr. Martoni?  
 37 DR. MARTONI: Yes.  
 38 MR. BARKER: Ms. Means?  
 39 MS. MEANS: No.  
 40 MR. BARKER: Mr. Palmiere?  
 41 MR. PALMIERE: Yes.  
 42 MR. BARKER: Ms. Ranalli-Russell?  
 43 MS. RANALLI-RUSSELL: Yes.  
 44 MR. BARKER: Mr. Walton?  
 45 MR. WALTON: Yes.

1 In this particular case, I'm not going to accuse  
 2 anybody of anything. But I will tell you in the last 40  
 3 years, I've personally have experienced situations, in one  
 4 job in particular, where I was told do not speak to the  
 5 union people. So does that exist today? I'm not going to  
 6 say. But in terms of this, I don't think it hurts to have  
 7 somebody have their eye just watching you.  
 8 So for that reason alone, I intend to support  
 9 this. Thank you.  
 10 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Representative Klein? I  
 11 mean, I'm sorry, Kirk.  
 12 MS. KIRK: I'll just say I think a lot of piece  
 13 of --- people have expressed their voices and I'd like to  
 14 call for the vote.  
 15 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: If there's no more ---  
 16 rather than do the --- if there's no more comment, we'll  
 17 take the vote.  
 18 MR. CATENA: Point of clarity, Mr. President.  
 19 Are you still the sponsor, Mr. Walton, or is ---?  
 20 MR. WALTON: I will --- I will gladly share it  
 21 with Member Futules.  
 22 MR. KRESS: I have a question.  
 23 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Go ahead.  
 24 MR. KRESS: Okay. So you're --- you're going to  
 25 still stay on here, in the motion?  
 26 MR. WALTON: Yes.  
 27 MR. KRESS: Okay.  
 28 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Can I be a co-sponsor, also?  
 29 MR. WALTON: Well --- and with that in mind, I  
 30 will defer to Mr. Ellenbogen and Mr. Futules and withdraw

 32 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Well, I'll also like to be a  
 33 co-sponsor. Put me on there.  
 34 MS. KIRK: Don't you work for them?  
 35 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: What?

 37 them?  
 38 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: No.  
 39 MR. KLEIN: Retired.  
 40 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Retired. That's --- there's  
 41 no conflict. I don't want to get into wasting time. It's

1 MR. BARKER: President Defazio?  
 2 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Yes.

 4 abstention, the bill passes.  
 5 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. 10249-17.  
 6 MR. BARKER: Communication summarizing approved

 33 to repair it and put it back, and I just wanted to say  
 34 thank you.  
 35 Thank you, Mr. President.  
 36 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. All right. You want  
 37 to read off the ---?  
 38 MR. BARKER: The only individual we had signed  
 39 up was Joseph Marszalek, who appears to not be here.  
 40 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Okay. Someone want to make  
 41 a motion to adjourn?  
 42 MR. WALTON: Motion to adjourn.  
 43 MR. ELLENBOGEN: Second.  
 44 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: All those in favor signify  
 45 by saying aye.

1 (Chorus of ayes.)  
2 PRESIDENT DEFAZIO: Opposed? The ayes have it  
3 Meeting adjourned.
