1 PRESIDENT CATENA: Good evening. I'd like to  
 2 call this meeting of Allegheny County Council to order.  
 3 Please rise for the Pledge of Allegiance.  
 4 (Pledge of Allegiance.)

 3 MR. VARHOLA: Ms. Bennett?  
 4 PRESIDENT CATENA: He's amending the agenda to  
 5 add an appointee to go to appointment review for the  
 6 Civilian Police Review Board.  
 7 MR. VARHOLA: Motion to amend the agenda. On  
 8 the question. Ms. Bennett?  
 9 MS. BENNETT: Yes.  
 10 MR. VARHOLA: Mr. Betkowski?  
 11 MR. BETKOWSKI: Yes.  
 12 MR. VARHOLA: Mr. DeMarco?  
 13 MR. DEMARCO: Yes.  
 14 MR. VARHOLA: Mr. President, let the  
 15 record show Mr. Duerr arrived and he's here.  
 16 Mr. Duerr?

 41 PRESIDENT CATENA: Okay. Do you want to make -?  
 42 MR. WALTON: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to add -  
 43 submit for consideration by the appointment review  
 44 committee - for consideration by the appointment review

1 committee David Borgdorff. I sent all - Dwight, I  
 2 apologize. Dwight.  
 3 Yesterday we sent his resume to all members of  
 4 Council. Barring any - barring any objections, I'd like  
 5 that to be considered at appointment review committee for  
 6 the ninth member of the Independent Police Review Board at  
 7 their earliest convenience.  
 8 MR. MACEY: Second.  
 9 PRESIDENT CATENA: Motion has been made and  
 10 seconded. Any discussion?  
 11 MR. FUTULES: Yes.  
 12 PRESIDENT CATENA: Go ahead.  
 13 MR. FUTULES: When he says earliest convenience,  
 14 are you referring to tonight?  
 15 MR. WALTON: No. They meet this week, I think.  
 16 MR. FUTULES: Okay.  
 17 MR. WALTON: Member Chapkis.  
 18 MS. NACCARATI-CHAPKIS: We met last week, so we  
 19 would have to schedule a meeting, which would be into the  
 20 - would that be into the new year then, Ken? Yes. Into  
 21 the new year.  
 22 MR. WALTON: Okay. At their next meeting.  
 23 PRESIDENT CATENA: Go ahead.  
 24 MS. HALLAM: I just had one question about it.  
 25 It's more like an order question. I was under the  
 26 understanding that the joint appointment was done by the  
 27 county executive with council's approval.  
 28 MR. WALTON: It's not mandated in that format.  
 29 We can either get a recommendation from the executive or  
 30 we can agree - we can agree on a nomination to be  
 31 submitted to the executive for his approval as well.  
 32 Because if you remember in the last - the last individual  
 33 that we recommended to the executive for consideration,  
 34 and then upon submission of that named to the executive he  
 35 declined.  
 36 MS. HALLAM: I don't remember that.  
 37 MR. DUERR: Councilwoman Hallam, the last  
 38 meeting of the special committee on independent review  
 39 applicants, we had as a group recommended David Mirnick to  
 40 the administration for consideration for the joint  
 41 appointment. Following that recommendation Mr. Mirnick  
 42 reached back out to us and said that he would like remove  
 43 himself from consideration.  
 44 MS. HALLAM: Okay.

1 MR. DUERR: So in a similar fashion, this would  
 2 be a similar way of us passing along the name if  
 3 affirmatively recommended to the administration saying  
 4 okay, we are - council at least is recommending this  
 5 person as a potential for the joint appoint for the IPRB.  
 6 MS. HALLAM: Okay. So unlike our other four  
 7 where we vote yes, and then it doesn't need to get  
 8 approved, and unlike the execs for where he puts them  
 9 forward and we don't have to approve it, we can still put  
 10 this forward, it's just pending signing off basically like  
 11 the county exec.  
 12 MR. DUERR: Yes.  
 13 MS. HALLAM: Cool. All right. I'm good. Thank  
 14 you.  
 15 PRESIDENT CATENA: Thank you. I don't believe  
 16 this needs a vote because it's going to -  
 17 MR. VARHOLA: Correct. You're going to just  
 18 review it to committee.  
 19 PRESIDENT CATENA: Yeah, it's going to  
 20 appointment review, so -  
 21 At this point in time we'll move on to the Chief  
 22 Executive quarterly address.  
 23 MR. FITZGERALD: Thank you, Mr. President and  
 24 members of Council. Being that this is the last one of  
 25 the year, kind of quarterly address, but also kind of a  
 26 year end wrap up as well. We've got - I think we've had a  
 27 pretty successful - getting a lot of things done  
 28 throughout this year, and I'll hit on some of the  
 29 highlights.  
 30 I'll start with some of the economic development  
 31 issues. Just over the last few weeks, few months a ground  
 32 breaking out in South Fayette, the Alpine Business Park, a  
 33 big development that's happening out there. AHN, has  
 34 added a chill mobile for our students, for young people to  
 35 have - dealing with mental health issues and depression  
 36 and things like that, going around to our 43 school  
 37 districts here in Allegheny County.  
 38 Carnegie Science Center was - wonderful exhibit  
 39 that they're putting on. The next step, the Mars exhibit,  
 40 moving to - on to the next frontier so to speak, along  
 41 with Astrobotic and the museum that they've opened over on  
 42 the Northside. UPMC opening up a service center in the  
 43 Lincoln Lamar East Liberty area for people beyond just  
 44 health, but other issues that people in the community  
 45 would be dealing with.

1 We broke ground finally on the BRT, something  
 2 we've been working on for more than a decade, linking  
 3 downtown Pittsburgh and Oakland and with high speed  
 4 transportation, getting more cars off the road, which I  
 5 think is something we all would like to see improving.  
 6 Transportation improving, air quality, et cetera.  
 7 Big Earthworks ground breaking over in  
 8 Sharpsburg along the riverfront, as we continue to develop  
 9 our riverfront properties, as the things alike that are  
 10 happening in Lawrenceville and the Strip District continue  
 11 to kind of expand out in places like Millville,  
 12 Sharpsburg, Aetna. There was a Millville Market ribbon  
 13 cutting opening, and other business happening in that  
 14 community, which is really, really good.  
 15 The National Aviary opened up the wetlands over  
 16 in the Northside, which is also something we can be very,  
 17 very proud of. And in the community of Swissvale, power  
 18 recovery campus got - brought by Councilman - or excuse  
 19 me, Senator Costa and Representative Doyle, dealing with  
 20 people who are dealing with recovery. We know what that  
 21 has had to deal with in this community and across this  
 22 country.  
 23 Going along those lines I wanted to add some of  
 24 the things that are happening out at the airport. As air  
 25 service is coming back, air travel is coming back to some  
 26 degree after COVID, a new airline that we've announced  
 27 awhile back, Breeze Airlines is adding service to southern  
 28 California, which we can use obviously. More west coast  
 29 service is really important. They're actually continuing  
 30 their service to Norfolk, Virginia, Charleston, South  
 31 Carolina, Providence, Rhode Island and Hartford. Also  
 32 adding service to New Orleans, which is where a lot of  
 33 people in Pittsburgh would like to go to on a regular  
 34 basis.  
 35 Air Canada coming back with Montreal and Toronto  
 36 service, which is obviously important for our trading  
 37 partners to the north.  
 38 Sun Airlines, one of the ultra low cost  
 39 carriers, which we've got four or five of them here in  
 40 Pittsburgh International Airport, adding service to  
 41 Minneapolis and St. Paul's. And then, the big thing that  
 42 we did, that we worked on, back in October I took a  
 43 delegation to Christina Cassotis of about two dozen -  
 44 about 30 corporate and community leaders over to London to

1 November the county manager and his team recognized 11  
 2 employees from the health department. They were given the  
 3 exemplary employee award. These were folks that worked  
 4 seven days a week, literally for a full year, including  
 5 holidays, weekends, vacations and more. A team that  
 6 really worked on behalf of the citizens of this region of  
 7 Allegheny County and did some great, great work.  
 8 Also, along human service lines, I wanted to  
 9 note that - that the Second Street Commons is now open.  
 10 It opened a couple of weeks ago along with the Smithfield  
 11 United Church of Christ, which gives homeless people the  
 12 ability to have some shelter and some services that can be  
 13 done in an important way, and I think working with the  
 14 human service department and all the folks we're going to  
 15 continue to work with, it's really an important thing, and  
 16 I think most of us want to see, you know, some remedy on  
 17 some of the things that have happened along those lines.  
 18 We've also had a very, very impactful year in  
 19 the parks department. Just recently the ice skating rinks  
 20 in north and south park have come online and opened up.  
 21 We also had an announcement a few weeks ago with the  
 22 American Rescue Plan money that we're going to be  
 23 contributing to \$20 million worth of trail connections and  
 24 trail improvements that are so important to just about  
 25 every community in this county that are very important to  
 26 those things that are happening.  
 27 The two Net Zero parks that we're moving on,  
 28 that the county manager and the parks department about  
 29 working on and moving forward solar panels being installed  
 30 at White Oak Park as we speak, designed for the Boyce Park  
 31 climbing wall is beginning, and hopefully that will be  
 32 open next year. Snow makings beginning, and hopefully by  
 33 Christmas we will have - depending on the weather and how  
 34 cold it gets, we'll have the ski slope opened up.  
 35 I also wanted to note that in South Park they  
 36 opened an innovative playground called Bank Shots, which  
 37 is really designed to help young people with disabilities  
 38 to have an experience in the parks that they might not  
 39 have had on a traditional playground and we're very, very  
 40 excited about that.  
 41 We're also beginning the holiday laser show  
 42 beginning at North Park for people that have gone to that  
 43 before. It's been very, very successful, and I also know  
 44 it's Settler's Cabin, the Botanic Garden has begun their  
 45 light show that's happening out there, so there's just a

1 try to get expanded service with British Airways. We had  
 2 four-day-a-week service.  
 3 We initially got a very good response, and  
 4 actually they have increased their service by 50 percent,  
 5 which is such an important trading partner for us over  
 6 into Europe and obviously into - into the UK. The TMP,  
 7 the modernization program continues to move forward in a  
 8 positive way. Neighborhood 91 has added another  
 9 manufacturer, Cumberland Company. Don Hickton, one of our  
 10 CEO leaders in this community bringing that there.  
 11 And then, probably the biggest thing that we've  
 12 had in the last half century - I was delighted last week  
 13 to go to the opening after many years of Shell Petra  
 14 Chemical Plant. This is the biggest economic development  
 15 project that's been in this region half a century,  
 16 three-quarters of a century, going back a long, long way.  
 17 9,000 of our workers at one point were working on that -  
 18 on that project. It's estimated to bring an economic  
 19 impact to this region of about \$3.7 billion just with that  
 20 plant. And I think that's only the beginning of what  
 21 we're going to see around manufacturing.  
 22 I almost compare it to when the first blast  
 23 furnaces came a hundred years or so ago and we saw a lot  
 24 of metal shops, machine shops, many mills, smaller steel  
 25 mills and manufacturing plants that came about that. I  
 26 think we're going to see the very same thing with what's  
 27 happening at Shell. It's going to probably be roughly  
 28 10,000 jobs when you add all the suppliers and all the  
 29 people that will be working on that. There are also going  
 30 to be going to Net Zero by - I think it's 2050, so they're  
 31 moving in a very good way. It will be one of the greenest  
 32 plants out there, and the recycling is also going to be a  
 33 very, very big opportunity. For not just this region, but  
 34 all throughout this state.  
 35 So it was a great event that they had last week  
 36 at the convention center. It was also good to see it done  
 37 in a bipartisan manner. It had Governor Corbett and  
 38 Governor Wolf both being there who had worked on this  
 39 together in the previous administration, and obviously  
 40 Governor Wolf was very, very proud to be there when that  
 41 plant came online and was doing the things that it was  
 42 doing.  
 43 I want to move on into the health department.  
 44 I'm not going to recapture and review COVID. We know what  
 45 we've been through over these past couple of years, but in

1 lot of good things that are happening in our parks right  
 2 now, and I think, again, it's something we all should be  
 3 very proud of. And I know all your constituents weigh in  
 4 a lot on the condition of the parks and things that they'd  
 5 like to see at the parks, whether it be the pickle ball  
 6 courts, whether it be the trails, whatever it might be,  
 7 and we want to continue to invest and work on our parks  
 8 and quality of life is so important to that endeavor.  
 9 I want to give a little kudos to our county  
 10 police. Congratulations, they were given the child  
 11 abduction response team certification. So again, our  
 12 county police continue to do a lot of good work, not  
 13 always getting the notoriety and the publicity they  
 14 deserve or they should get, but they're doing some really,  
 15 really good stuff.  
 16 Also, in October I was delighted to join the  
 17 public defender's office in bringing on 12 new hires for  
 18 the P.D.'s office. And these 12 new law clerks coming  
 19 from some of the best law schools from around the country,  
 20 both locally and nationally, which was something, you  
 21 know, we can be very, very proud of that these young men  
 22 and women who are many a time beginning their careers,  
 23 getting a start in the P.D.'s office. And we appreciate  
 24 the work that they do.  
 25 One of the most important works that we do is  
 26 obviously infrastructure and public works. And one of the  
 27 things I've tried to do every year with the county manager  
 28 and Director Shanley, is to make sure that we pave 40  
 29 miles of road every year. We own 400 miles of road in  
 30 Allegheny County. The Society of Civil Engineers  
 31 estimates you should do ten percent every year. I know  
 32 you're all good at math, but 400 divided by 10 is 40  
 33 miles. It looks like we're going to do about 41 this  
 34 year. So it will be the seventh year in a row in which we  
 35 have exceeded that goal.  
 36 And I know, obviously bridges have been in the  
 37 news and given a lot of people, you know, concern about  
 38 what we have and our bridges. I can tell you that we have  
 39 305 county bridges that are eight feet or longer, and only  
 40 seven percent of those at this point are rated poor.  
 41 That's 20 out of that 305. Five of them are going to be  
 42 done next year, 13 will be done between '23 and '25, and  
 43 two are in design, so that would clear, you know, a lot of  
 44 that up. So there's a lot of good work that's been done,  
 45 and obviously now with the infrastructure funding that's

1 coming from the federal government on the bill that just  
 2 passed, within the last year, we're going to see more  
 3 investment in our roads and bridges, broadband and those  
 4 type of things, and I think it's really important.  
 5 Also, the announcement that we made a little  
 6 while back of the lighting of the three sister bridges,  
 7 the Clemente, the Warhol and Rachel Carson Bridge, I think  
 8 that's really going to add to vibrancy of what we see in  
 9 downtown and the North Shore. And I really applaud the  
 10 public works department for coming up with, you know, some  
 11 innovative ideas and the funding to be able to do that.  
 12 And then just recently while it's not  
 13 specifically a county project, but it really is county  
 14 work, ASDE, the American Society of Design Engineers,  
 15 nationally awarded the \$79 cap or park project over on the  
 16 28 acre site of the former Civic Arena. The award - the  
 17 number one award for the nation in design and construction  
 18 to that project. That's a joint project with PennDOT, the  
 19 SCA, the city, the county, the URA, all coming together  
 20 The Tiger Grant that we had gotten awhile back from the  
 21 federal government was obviously instrumental in making  
 22 that happen.  
 23 Special events, we have our concert series  
 24 that's going on that was interrupted for awhile with  
 25 COVID, with our school kids coming in performing every  
 26 afternoon at lunchtime for the folks in the courthouse,  
 27 and it's been very successful the first week that it's  
 28 been going on.  
 29 We also awarded the Veteran's award, the very  
 30 first Chuck Martoni Veterans Award. This is to somebody  
 31 who is a veteran, who served this country and the Armed  
 32 Service, and continues to come back and serve the fellow  
 33 citizens in this region. Chuck Martoni certainly  
 34 exemplified that, and the first award was awarded last  
 35 week to Nathan Mallory. Nathan Mallory works with  
 36 veterans, he's been very instrumental in integrating and  
 37 helping people, particularly in the LGBTQ+ community with  
 38 some sports programs, and some housing, and his workforce  
 39 development. So we're proud that Nathan was given that  
 40 award.  
 41 And that's about all I have, Mr. President. If  
 42 anybody has any questions or wants to go into further  
 43 detail, I'll be glad to do that.  
 44 PRESIDENT CATENA: Thank you. Are there any  
 45 questions? Councilman Futules.

1 MR. FUTULES: Yeah, I have one simple one. The  
 2 homeless shelter that just opened, I thought I saw on the  
 3 news that it only could sleep 14 people. Was I wrong?  
 4 MR. FITZGERALD: No, I think it's around 90, 95.  
 5 MR. FUTULES: Oh, wow. That's far from 14.  
 6 MR. FITZGERALD: And then, I think there's an  
 7 additional - if crowded can add additional 40, I believe.  
 8 I can maybe get that information from our Department of  
 9 Human Services.  
 10 But I'm glad you brought that up, because I was  
 11 remiss in going through that very quickly, but I really  
 12 want to thank - it was a partnership of UPMC, AHN and PNC  
 13 who basically funded it. Obviously Human Services will be  
 14 helping to operate it with, you know, some of our  
 15 contracted partners, but those three entities really  
 16 stepped up and provided the funding to make sure that we  
 17 can build that Second Avenue Commons -  
 18 MR. FUTULES: Well, I'm certainly hoping that -  
 19 the homeless people don't have TV to watch and see it  
 20 open, so how were they made aware - I would assume police  
 21 officers and help the - people went into the community and  
 22 said, hey, here's a place for you to go now.  
 23 MR. FITZGERALD: There are outreach individuals  
 24 who have been going around various encampments and various  
 25 individuals to allow the - you know, let people know that  
 26 the services are available.  
 27 I've driven past it a number of times, and it  
 28 seems to be I see people going in, and sometimes even a  
 29 line of people all line up to get into the shelter.  
 30 MR. FUTULES: That's a good thing. Thank you.  
 31 PRESIDENT CATENA: Councilman Duerr.  
 32 MR. DUERR: County Executive Fitzgerald, I  
 33 wanted to pass along, you know, my thanks and  
 34 congratulations to David Voye in the Elections Department  
 35 for what was a very - seemed to be relatively calm  
 36 Election Day. I think everyone in that office can be very  
 37 proud of not just how quickly we got our mail-in ballots  
 38 out, but just how quickly they were counted. Allegheny  
 39 County seems to be continuing to be the standard in the  
 40 Commonwealth for getting our results out as fast as we  
 41 can, and one of the things I wanted to ask you was, has  
 42 there been any other counties that have reached out to us  
 43 to perhaps learn about the ways and the systems we have in  
 44 place in order to count those ballots as fast as we have  
 45 and release those results as fast as we do?

1 I see that as being - you know, election night  
 2 was, I think, a lot, you know, less stressful for a lot of  
 3 people regardless, you know, of a party because we had  
 4 pretty much every polling location and mail-in ballot  
 5 counted by - I think it was about midnight. So you know,  
 6 it was a relatively calm night for what was a relatively  
 7 robust turnout for midterm elections.  
 8 So first off, I wanted to pass on the  
 9 congratulations and well wishes to Dave Voye and the rest  
 10 of the Elections Department, but I'm just very curious if  
 11 anyone is going to be copying our work here, because it  
 12 seems like this should be the standard for counting,  
 13 certainly mail in ballots across the Commonwealth.  
 14 MR. FITZGERALD: Well, as they say, imitation is  
 15 the sincerest form of flattery, and I know - I get many  
 16 calls nationally as well as statewide. I was at the  
 17 county executive's meeting last week in Washington at the  
 18 White House, and they noticed. They knew.  
 19 I'm going to brag a little bit. We're only the  
 20 second biggest county in the Commonwealth. There is some  
 21 county in the east that's got 300,000 more people than us  
 22 and 170,000 more registered voters and we out voted them  
 23 by 70,000 votes. So I think that's a real testament to  
 24 the work. And I know the county manager and my chief of  
 25 staff and the whole staff down there, they pretty much  
 26 live at that warehouse for a couple of days. I know the  
 27 councilman has been there watching things that have gone  
 28 on, but since the Act 77 of 2020, we've been proud that  
 29 we've been able to put the results up so that when people  
 30 go to bed that night, candidates know one way or the other  
 31 where they're going to be.  
 32 They were actually done counting by  
 33 mid-afternoon and posted those results at 8:02, which was  
 34 - again, gives people assurity and you know, you look at  
 35 what's going on in Nevada and Arizona and California when  
 36 six days, seven days, ten days later they're still - you  
 37 know, it's something I think people have a right to know  
 38 what's going on. And yes, many counties from around this  
 39 Commonwealth have talked to the county manager and talked  
 40 to his team to see, you know, how we can do it. And we  
 41 just got to keep improving and keep working on it. And  
 42 I'm sure there will be changes.  
 43 There's a new legislature coming in, and there's  
 44 always been rumblings about how - you know, when you  
 45 count, how you can count and all those type of things.

1 And we'll try to be nimble and do the things that we can  
 2 do.  
 3 MR. DUERR: Yeah. And a second question in  
 4 regards to some of your comments about some of the public  
 5 works. The longer term public works initiatives and  
 6 plans, you mentioned the bridges, some are going to be  
 7 completed or started in the coming years, some will move  
 8 past that. You know, the - your term is coming to an end  
 9 and we will see a new administration following next year.  
 10 I was wondering how - and this could just be my,  
 11 you know, noviceness coming into play here, but you know,  
 12 do you feel comfortable, and was the process of passing  
 13 along those longer term public works projects to the next  
 14 incoming administration? Do you feel confident that those  
 15 public works - specifically you mentioned bridges, making  
 16 sure that we're, you know, reassuring the public that with  
 17 the changing of the - from one administration to another,  
 18 that these things will not fall through the cracks? How  
 19 is that process started? Do you still feel confident in  
 20 that timeline that you laid out that those public works  
 21 projects like those bridges are going to still be  
 22 completed in that timeline. And do you foresee any  
 23 hiccups in changing of administrations to inhibit that  
 24 timeline?  
 25 MR. FITZGERALD: Well, I can't answer what a  
 26 future administration is going to do.  
 27 MR. DUERR: Yeah.  
 28 MR. FITZGERALD: What I can tell you that we're  
 29 going to do is we're going to make sure that we leave the  
 30 infrastructure and this county in a good place. The plans  
 31 that Director Shanley and his team, the bridge engineers  
 32 will continue to move forward.  
 33 And many things, when it comes to the bridge  
 34 construction, these are plans that are often put on the  
 35 tip, which is the long range plan five, six, seven years  
 36 in advance. Because the funding - you know, you do a  
 37 bridge - we're only five percent of the funding that comes  
 38 to a bridge. Eighty (80) percent comes from the federal  
 39 government. Obviously they just passed a robust  
 40 infrastructure bill. Fifteen (15) percent of it comes  
 41 from PennDOT, from the state and the local match being the  
 42 county, we put in five percent. So we put those plans in  
 43 place. A future administration, if they want to try to  
 44 change them, that will be up to them, but we're going to  
 45 try make sure not just our bridges and roads, but the

1 buildings, the parks, the finances, et cetera, are left in  
 2 good condition.  
 3 I know one thing, it will be in a better  
 4 condition than when I found it when I came in. So we're  
 5 going to keep working on that.  
 6 MR. DUERR: Thank you.  
 7 PRESIDENT CATENA: Councilman Walton.  
 8 MR. WALTON: I'll be brief. I know you  
 9 presented for a long time. So I want to make two points.  
 10 First, I want to thank you for having in place the staff  
 11 that you have at DHS. Karen Dalton is doing an incredible  
 12 job there.  
 13 Particularly in the wide range of delivering a  
 14 wide range of services that DHS is engaged in,  
 15 particularly an immediate situation. A young man that I  
 16 encounter who was on probation and was attempting to  
 17 become an apprentice for the Steamfitters. He was living  
 18 in his car and he was beginning to have problems with his  
 19 probation officer, because in order to stay out he needed  
 20 to have a residence. I called in and asked for help to  
 21 find housing for this guy. Erin called me back several  
 22 days later, she found housing for him in a shelter, which  
 23 gave him an address. And ultimately, he is now an  
 24 apprentice with Steamfitters 449. So thank you for those  
 25 delivery of services and helping keeping somebody from  
 26 going back. That they're going to be paying taxes and  
 27 value to Allegheny County.  
 28 And furthermore, I want to thank you for having  
 29 a good year in 2022 of me knowing of at least six  
 30 individuals that you hired to the county during this year  
 31 with prior criminal convictions, and they're now employees  
 32 of Allegheny County doing good work, making positive  
 33 contributions, adding value to our society. So thank you  
 34 for looking at them, being open to giving folks second  
 35 chances at life. I appreciate you, and Wooly and Jen have  
 36 been incredibly invaluable in making sure that folks get  
 37 real legitimate shots at turning their lives around.  
 38 I spend every day working to try to identify  
 39 folks and the county has been a real responsive partner in  
 40 dealing with folks that have challenges and removing -  
 41 thank you.  
 42 MR. FITZGERALD: Thank you. And I appreciate the  
 43 words for the Human Service Department, Erin and her team.  
 44 It's interesting, we had the institute of politics  
 45 invited, the Harvard Kennedy School here last week, and in

1 some of our private suppliers in trying to find more need.  
 2 So it's going to be an ongoing problem. It's an ongoing  
 3 challenge.  
 4 I will give, again, kudos to human services just  
 5 a couple of years ago when there was veterans challenge  
 6 that President Obama put out to eliminate veterans  
 7 homelessness. I think we had maybe 200 or 300 at the  
 8 time. And formerly Director Churna worked with our  
 9 Veterans Services Department. Some of the folks that we  
 10 mention here tonight, and got it down to zero. And  
 11 obviously it's an ongoing issue, because some veterans do  
 12 become homeless over time. But these are just challenges  
 13 that need to be worked on every day, every week. It's  
 14 never probably going to be eliminated, it's just something  
 15 you're just going to have to continue to work on. We're  
 16 going to have to rely on some of our friends, and whether  
 17 it be Catholic charities, whether it be some of our other  
 18 agencies that are out there, and it's just a challenge,  
 19 and we'll work with all the partners we can.  
 20 MS. HALLAM: Okay. So regarding that, then, I  
 21 know we're seeing a lot on the news, and any of us who  
 22 drive through the city really at any given time, we see  
 23 the tent encampments with homeless folks who are living in  
 24 these tents on the various corners. I know that I read  
 25 tonight actually they're doing a sweep of the encampment  
 26 on Stockton Avenue.  
 27 And so I've seen the red and grey tents, which  
 28 are by my understanding given out by DHS?  
 29 MR. FITZGERALD: No.  
 30 MS. HALLAM: No.  
 31 MR. FITZGERALD: No.  
 32 MS. HALLAM: Okay. So there's no tents given  
 33 out by DHS, so the outreach workers, the DHS outreach  
 34 workers, when they're going into those encampments, does  
 35 DHS have any involvement in the sweeps of the encampments?  
 36 Is there any sort of relationship? I would think, you  
 37 know, being a countywide human services - our countywide  
 38 Human Services Department, that we'd have some involvement  
 39 with - if the camps are getting swept, what we're going  
 40 to do with those folks if there's no space in the shelters  
 41 and Second Avenue Commons.  
 42 MR. FITZGERALD: Well, the County Human Services  
 43 Department has no authority to do a sweep, if you will,  
 44 the term you use. They can try to work with local  
 45 municipalities and local law enforcement if they're going

1 his introduction he called Allegheny County's Human  
 2 Service Department one of the best, if not the best in the  
 3 country, and a model that other agencies can - and other  
 4 departments can model themselves after.  
 5 I'll just give you one anecdotal story. I went  
 6 almost a year ago when the Afghan situation was coming and  
 7 refugees were coming to different parts of the world, and  
 8 Erin and her team really reached out to Afghan and Syrian  
 9 refugees. And I remember going to an event at a church,  
 10 Allegheny Center Alliance Church over on the Northside,  
 11 and those folks had just gotten here, having language  
 12 issues, having all kind of issues as you can imagine,  
 13 coming across the world, going into a new place.  
 14 And I went a few weeks ago right before  
 15 Thanksgiving, they had a lot of the same folks who were  
 16 there at the same place. And the difference in those  
 17 folks and how they've become acclimated to us here in  
 18 Allegheny County, and they had recruited a number of  
 19 volunteer families who were working with other families  
 20 and helping them become assimilated. So they've really  
 21 done a great job of bringing people, welcoming people, who  
 22 are obviously not in the best of situation, whether it's  
 23 from Ukraine, whether it's from Syria, Afghanistan and  
 24 other places around the world where there's obviously  
 25 issues. So kudos to them. They don't get a lot of  
 26 notoriety, they don't get a lot of attention, but really  
 27 they help and improve peoples' lives. So thank you.  
 28 PRESIDENT CATENA: Councilwoman Hallam.  
 29 MS. HALLAM: Thank you, President Catena. Yeah,  
 30 I do have a couple of questions based off of some of the  
 31 things that you've said.  
 32 So the first thing is, you know, when Councilman  
 33 Futules had his question about the Second Avenue Commons  
 34 and the emergency winter shelter on Smithfield. And you  
 35 know, we've all seen the line out the door, which to me  
 36 shows - reinforces what we've heard that the shelters are  
 37 full and that the need is more than the supply. So I  
 38 guess what I'm wondering is what kind of plan is there to  
 39 ensure that we have more of those resources available to  
 40 folks.  
 41 MR. FITZGERALD: Well, the resources that we get  
 42 only come from the state and federal government. Whatever  
 43 resources we are given, we can deploy locally. Human  
 44 services budget is, by and large, funded through the state  
 45 and federal government. And we've obviously worked with

1 to enforce the fact that they're not going to allow  
 2 encampments in certain areas.  
 3 Human Service can be a partner in try to help  
 4 people and try to find shelter and try to find housing.  
 5 Some of it can be through some of the public housing  
 6 departments including Allegheny County or the City of  
 7 Pittsburgh or the other municipalities that might have a  
 8 housing authority, and some of it might be some of these  
 9 shelters, halfway houses and some of the other  
 10 alternatives, but Human Services does not have the  
 11 authority to go in and say you have to move. That's up to  
 12 local law enforcement.  
 13 MS. HALLAM: And Department of Human Services  
 14 also isn't providing tents for people who are experiencing  
 15 homelessness?  
 16 MR. FITZGERALD: No.  
 17 MS. HALLAM: Okay. And so is the county doing  
 18 anything to maybe prevent these homeless encampments by  
 19 investing in affordable housing, maybe making needed  
 20 repairs to Allegheny County Housing Authority properties  
 21 that exist currently?  
 22 MR. FITZGERALD: Yeah, we're doing a lot of  
 23 that, a significant amount of that.  
 24 MS. HALLAM: Yeah, what is that? Can you tell  
 25 me a little bit more about that?  
 26 MR. FITZGERALD: I don't have the numbers in  
 27 front of me, but economic development has done millions  
 28 and millions of dollars and thousands of houses and places  
 29 for people to live.  
 30 MS. HALLAM: Okay. And the DHS did used to  
 31 operate the Safe Haven Hotel that was closed by DHS in the  
 32 spring?  
 33 MR. FITZGERALD: Did we operate that during  
 34 COVID?  
 35 DHS REPRESENTATIVE: It was there for COVID to  
 36 protect people during COVID who were homeless so they  
 37 could have a place to be there.  
 38 MR. FITZGERALD: Is that he one in Greentree?  
 39 DHS REPRESENTATIVE: Correct.  
 40 MR. FITZGERALD: Yeah.  
 41 MS. HALLAM: So is there any intention to maybe  
 42 reopen it and use it? I know not even to talk about COVID  
 43 not being over yet, but more so, we're obviously seeing  
 44 the need for it by the tent encampments, by the lines out  
 45 the door at the shelters. Is there any intention - you

1 know, does DHS have any plan in the next year to reopen  
 2 that?  
 3 MR. FITZGERALD: None that I'm aware of. And  
 4 the folks in Greentree weren't real happy about that  
 5 location.  
 6 MS. HALLAM: Okay. Next question - no, I'm  
 7 almost done. That was just one - that was like four in  
 8 one.  
 9 So my next question is specifically about a  
 10 conversation I've been hearing a lot about, you know, this  
 11 reassessment debacle in the court, and everything like  
 12 that. I'm not even asking you to go into that. I'm just  
 13 more wondering when, you know, it inevitably happens as a  
 14 result of the court case that's being decided right now,  
 15 if the appeals window is extended for people to file those  
 16 reassessment appeals. What is the County's plan to make  
 17 up lost revenues for the school districts, the  
 18 municipalities, you know, the Carnegie Library. What is  
 19 the plan? Are we going to provide any support for those  
 20 revenues?  
 21 MR. FITZGERALD: Well, first of all, we have  
 22 provided a tremendous increase in tax revenues for the  
 23 City of Pittsburgh School District over the last - the  
 24 development that's happened in this city has been a  
 25 tremendous increase, so they have really benefited from  
 26 the work we've done in the county.  
 27 The lost revenues - the lost revenues, I guess,  
 28 they can adjust their millage. That's what they can do.  
 29 So the plan of reassessment, I have no plan to reassess.  
 30 MS. HALLAM: I know.  
 31 MR. FITZGERALD: And you know, we're the only  
 32 state - I'm sorry, there are two states in the nation that  
 33 do not do regular countywide reassessments, Pennsylvania  
 34 and Delaware. And Delaware only has three counties. So  
 35 everybody else around the country does regular  
 36 reassessments. Pennsylvania doesn't, for whatever reason.  
 37 If the legislature decides that's what they want to do,  
 38 then we would participate in that. But unfortunately, the  
 39 counties around us, some of them haven't reassessed in 30,  
 40 40 and 50 years. So for us to reassess would put our  
 41 citizens at a real disadvantage competitively. It will  
 42 put this county in a competitive disadvantage.  
 43 So school districts and municipalities can  
 44 certainly adjust our millage at any time. Their boards

1 have that ability, just like this board has the ability to  
 2 do that.  
 3 MS. HALLAM: Okay. This is really my last  
 4 question coming up. So we - I know we saw - there was a  
 5 lot of pushback against increasing funding for the public  
 6 defender's office, medical examiner court records, things  
 7 that are under the administrative purview. And I saw  
 8 recently that the Steelworkers reached a Collective  
 9 Bargaining Agreement, and I know based off of the proposed  
 10 budget and the timing of the agreement being reached, that  
 11 there's not funding in those departments to fund that  
 12 contract, but yet the county has to.  
 13 So we heard various presentations from your  
 14 administration, we'll find the money, we'll make sure the  
 15 money is there, which we have to do by law, but maybe you  
 16 can answer the question that a lot of us had - had where  
 17 exactly that money is going to come from. Is it going to  
 18 be services, programs, even staff positions cut from those  
 19 departments? Will it be taken from other departments  
 20 throughout the county? Where do you plan on getting that  
 21 money to fund that contract?  
 22 MR. FITZGERALD: Well, first of all, we're proud  
 23 of the fact that this county's bond rating is the highest  
 24 its been in 40 years, four decades. The county manager  
 25 and his administration in this budget department has done  
 26 a tremendous job. In fact, we've only raised taxes one  
 27 time in 21 years. Twenty (20) out of 21 years, the  
 28 citizens of Allegheny County have had the same taxes that  
 29 they've always had. So the fiscal responsibility and the  
 30 fiscal work that this group continues to do is tremendous.  
 31 And they'll continue to do it.  
 32 So the money is there, I believe the county  
 33 manager indicated during the budget hearings that the  
 34 money was in place and it will be in place, and it will be  
 35 in place. And we have fully funded the public defenders  
 36 office, I've funded the public defender's office during my  
 37 administration more than previous administrations have  
 38 done that. The district attorney actually for the first  
 39 time sent a letter saying, thank you, I got everything I  
 40 needed and didn't ask for any more money.  
 41 MS. HALLAM: I saw the letter.  
 42 MR. FITZGERALD: It was unprecedented in the 11  
 43 years that I have been county executive, so we've worked  
 44 with our partners and with our teams, and they will meet

1 the budgetary obligations as they have every year of my  
 2 administration.  
 3 MS. HALLAM: Okay. So just to clarify, because  
 4 I don't really feel like the question was answered - and  
 5 this isn't another question. I just really don't feel  
 6 like it was answered. Are you saying that when your  
 7 budget was proposed months ago you had already foreseen  
 8 what future contract negotiations would look like and you  
 9 included all of that money in the budget you proposed?  
 10 MR. FITZGERALD: Yes.  
 11 MS. HALLAM: Okay. Thank you very much.  
 12 PRESIDENT CATENA: Okay. Thank you, Mr. Chief  
 13 Executive.  
 14 MR. FITZGERALD: All right. Thank you, guys.  
 15 Have a good holiday. Take care.  
 16 PRESIDENT CATENA: You too. Proclamations and

 41 MR. VARHOLA: Approving the appointment of  
 42 Guillermo Velazquez to the Community College of Allegheny  
 43 County Board of Trustees for a term to expire on December  
 44 31st, 2023, sponsored by the Chief Executive.  
 45 PRESIDENT CATENA: Ms. Naccarati-Chapkis.

1 MS. NACCARATI-CHAPKIS: President Catena, the  
 2 appointment review committee met on December the 8th, 2022  
 3 and affirmatively recommended Mr. Velazquez to this board.  
 4 And I would like to make that motion.  
 5 MR. MACEY: Second.  
 6 PRESIDENT CATENA: Motion has been made and  
 7 seconded. Any discussion? Hearing no discussion, please  
 8 take a roll call vote.  
 9 MR. VARHOLA: On the motion to approve, Ms.  
 10 Bennett?  
 11 MS. BENNETT: Yes.  
 12 MR. VARHOLA: Mr. Belkowski?  
 13 MR. BETKOWSKI: Yes.

1 PRESIDENT CATENA: I mean, you can go on - if  
 2 you're against it, you can go on the record against it,  
 3 obviously in a voice vote, so - I'm just trying to  
 4 expedite for time.  
 5 12491-22.  
 6 MS. NACCARATI-CHAPKIS: The appointment review  
 7 committee met on December the 8th, 2022 and affirmatively  
 8 recommended Dr. Arrington to the CCAC Board of Trustees,  
 9 and I would like to make that motion.  
 10 MR. MACEY: Second.  
 11 PRESIDENT CATENA: Do you want to read that one?  
 12 MR. VARHOLA: Yeah. Approving the appointment  
 13 of Elayne Arrington, Ph.D. to the Community College of  
 14 Allegheny County Board of Trustees for a term to expire on

 16 PRESIDENT CATENA: Motion has been made and  
 17 seconded. Any discussion?  
 18 MS. HALLAM: I have something, President Catena.

 20 MS. HALLAM: Yeah, I just want to say for the  
 21 record - I don't know if anyone really looked at some of  
 22 the expiration dates on these appointments that are before  
 23 us today, but going forward I am not going to be voting to  
 24 approve any appointments to exceed the first two years of  
 25 the new County Executive's term. I think that some of  
 26 these dates - December 31st, 2028 are absolutely  
 27 ridiculous. You know, we had conversation here before  
 28 about binding the hands of future county executives.  
 29 Man, this really does it more than anything  
 30 else. So I understand one year past the term for some  
 31 transition. I'll even give you two years. You know, I  
 32 see one until December 31st, 2025, but the rest of these,  
 33 nothing personal against any of the people. I understand  
 34 that certain boards and authorities do have statutory  
 35 guidelines for how long the terms need to be when they're  
 36 appointed, but there are hundreds of expired terms that  
 37 people are sitting on, on various boards and authorities  
 38 throughout this county. There is no reason that these  
 39 appointments need to be put forward right now. They can  
 40 simply wait for the next county executive to point and  
 41 they can sit on expired terms like so many other people do  
 42 today. So out of principal, I'm going to be voting no on  
 43 a majority of these appointments today, including this  
 44 one.

1 PRESIDENT CATENA: Motion has been made and  
 2 seconded. Any discussion? Hearing no discussion -  
 3 MR. PALMIERE: Mr. President?

 17 Trustees. Thank you, Mr. President.

 30 underprivileged communities and I come to you guys today  
 31 hoping for support and any faculty of that. We plan on  
 32 asking how the gentlemen that was speaking earlier, we  
 33 plan on bringing the quality of life back to that Mon  
 34 Valley area, because we know in different areas,  
 35 specifically Clairton, McKeesport, Duquesne, we have  
 36 population declining and we have other crimes rising. And  
 37 I just wanted to come here today as a member of that  
 38 community saying that basically we need help.  
 39 I coach for the Clairton - there's a couple  
 40 things I left out. I coach for Clairton High School, and  
 41 since the season is over and we've had three kids arrested  
 42 and one kid shot, and it's only been a month or two,  
 43 barely.  
 44 But that area is really screaming out and crying  
 45 for help. And I've partnered with an amazing man that the

 18 So I just want to read my cover letter to you  
 19 guys and give you guys a more understanding from the  
 20 proposal from an indoor training facility and the  
 21 standpoint of where I'm coming from for that.  
 22 Dear Mr. Catena, and Mr. Fitzgerald, my name is  
 23 Lamont Wade. I worked my butt off to become the number  
 24 one quarterback recruit in the country for the class of  
 25 2017. After that I became a four-year letterman at the  
 26 Pennsylvania State University while graduating with my  
 27 B.S. in commercial and community recreation management.  
 28 Then I signed a free agent deal with the Pittsburgh  
 29 Steelers and participated in the 2021 preseason.  
 30 Currently, I'm a member of the USFL's Memphis  
 31 Showboats. I'm a diachard community first entrepreneur who  
 32 runs several small businesses that I started at the end of  
 33 2020.  
 34 In year one my non-profit raised nearly \$10,000  
 35 to donate to underprivileged children in terms of school  
 36 supplies, shopping trips and clothing drives. In that  
 37 same year, my clothing brand All Positive Energy and  
 38 Apparel saw revenue of over \$10,000 as well. Through  
 39 networking innovation and a progressive mindset towards  
 40 minority sustainability I've partnered with Vincent Lopez  
 41 and Parker Health to try to bring our community resources  
 42 we've never seen before.  
 43 We are in the beginning stages of structuring a  
 44 youth training and recreation center to primarily benefit  
 45 at-risk kids with sports specific training from grades K

1 budget for this - this project is over \$500,000. It can  
 2 bring 500 jobs to the area, as well as a \$15 to \$30  
 3 million reinvestment through different sectors of  
 4 healthcare, training, jobs and whatever that whole  
 5 facility entails. There's different things that is  
 6 included in the proposal that I sent to Jordan. And I  
 7 just, you know, wanted to get that message out to you guys  
 8 and hopefully that we can have any more further dialogue  
 9 on this topic, because we are in the beginning stages of  
 10 it.  
 11 I've been talking with him for the past year  
 12 about it, but we're kind of in the stages of setting up a  
 13 pre-fab - a pre-fab place and finding land and getting  
 14 pre-fab within the next few months, and from that pre-fab,  
 15 building from the ground up to something that can really  
 16 pull from different areas. Being, if you're from the  
 17 area, Clairton was a very nice city in the 1950s, '60s,  
 18 '70s and I feel like that area can still be that, being  
 19 around the South Hills, being around Mon Valley from  
 20 Monessen, Donora to Bethel Park, South Park, Upper St.  
 21 Clair, West Mifflin. Those areas can all buy into that.  
 22 And if there's any, you know, further questions  
 23 or anything that I can answer or anything -  
 24 PRESIDENT CATENA: Can you give your letter so  
 25 we have -?  
 26 MR. WADE: Yeah. I e-mailed it to Jordan, and I  
 27 can e-mail to whoever else -.  
 28 MR. FUTULES: Well, they'll send it to all of  
 29 us. I'm interested in what you had to say, and I'd like  
 30 to have that in writing so I can review it better.  
 31 MR. WADE: Definitely.  
 32 PRESIDENT CATENA: Yeah.  
 33 MR. FUTULES: You went real fast in the  
 34 beginning, and I tried to catch up.  
 35 MR. WADE: Yeah.  
 36 MR. FUTULES: But I would like to have that
