

Allegheny County Council Passes 2023 Budget

In December, 2022, Allegheny County Council passed the 2023 operating, capital, and grants and special accounts budgets. The budgets were passed without an increase in the property tax millage rate; indicating that the millage rate has remained the same as it has been since 2013 at 4.73 mills.


The two largest expenditure areas of the \$1.02 billion operating budget are health and welfare and public safety. These two areas are fundamental concerns for County Council and we will continue to work together with our partners and stakeholders to improve the wellbeing of all residents in Allegheny County. The capital budget totals \$84.4 million and highlights our dedication to investing in infrastructure and Capital Improvement Projects, which includes the maintenance of 533 bridges and 408 miles of inter-municipal roads.

Legislative Updates

Council approved – and the Chief Executive agreed to – the joint appointment of Dwight Boddorf to the County's Independent Police Review Board. With this appointment, the initial members of the Board have all been selected. The Board has begun meeting regularly in order to select its officers, formulate its bylaws, and determine how to proceed with meeting its training obligations. The Board has jurisdiction over complaints of misconduct involving Allegheny County Police officers, but any municipality within the County can opt into the program if it chooses to do so. Any recommendations made by the Board pursuant to its functions are advisory only.

Council passed Bill No. 12537-22, an ordinance that directs County departments, agencies, and offices to de-prioritize the enforcement of criminal prosecutions involving abortion procedures, should such procedures be criminalized nationally or within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. While the County does not have the ability to preempt Federal or Commonwealth law, the ordinance does establish County policy with regard to facilitating these types of prosecutions, should they take place. The Chief Executive signed this bill into law on January 26.

Council ratified changes to the Allegheny County Health Department regulations, Article XXI, in order to update the County's standards for volatile organic compound emissions from conventional and unconventional oil and gas sources. The updated regulation makes the County's requirements consistent with Federal and State limitations, and constitutes the first significant update to the oil and gas VOC regulations since 2015. The Chief Executive signed this change into law on January 26. The Commonwealth adopted identical standards statewide in 2022, and a complete copy of the County's air quality regulations (including the most up to date provisions) can be viewed at: https://www.alleghenycounty.us/uploadedFiles/Allegheny_Home/Health_Department/Article-21-Air-Pollution-Control.pdf.

Council passed Bill No. 12524-22 on January 24, and the Chief Executive signed this ordinance into law on January 26. This ordinance is one of several companion bills introduced in late 2022 to address the application of an incorrect Common Level Ratio (CLR) in the course of real estate assessment appeals in 2022. Because the inaccuracy was not fully revealed until well into in the calendar year, decisions in a significant number of appeals had already been finalized and the appeal deadline for 2022 was long passed. Bill No. 12524-22 establishes a special appeal window for property owners disadvantaged by the use of the incorrect CLR in 2022 in order to give those taxpayers an opportunity to remedy the inaccuracy. This special appeal window runs through March 31, 2023, and special appeal forms are available at: https://www.alleghenycounty.us/real-estate/forms.aspx. Please note that the regular filing deadline for 2023 assessment appeals is also March 31, and any property owner wishing to appeal for both years must file a separate form for each. The 2023 filing form is also available on the same web page as the 2022 form.

**The Allegheny County Board of Health is a nine-member governing board appointed by the County Chief Executive and subject to approval by County Council. Members serve staggered four-year terms and the board appoints and advises the County Health Director.

- **Board duties include:
- -Formulating rules and regulations for the prevention of disease
- -Preventing or fixing conditions that constitute a threat to public health
- -Promoting and preserving public health
- -Reviewing and approving Clean Air Fund expenditures

** Meetings are tentatively scheduled to be held in-person in the 4th Floor Gold Room of the Allegheny County Courthouse.

Meetings of the Allegheny County Board of Health are open to the public. If you would like to speak at a Board meeting, make your request at least 24 hours in advance of the meeting.


