## **Director's Report**

- Changes to COVID-19 vaccine guidance
- Selected for \$10 million EPA Targeted Airshed Grant
- Began treating wetlands for mosquito larvae
- Addressed American Lung Association's "State of the Air"
- Stipulated penalties
- Seeking responses for climate change survey
- Launching "Rethink Your Drink" campaign

#### **Overall Goal**

 Allegheny County residents lead healthy lives as demonstrated by their physical and behavioral health and the environments in which they live, learn, work, and play.



## **Physical Health Goals**

- People of all ages engage in behaviors that promote physical health and reduce the risk of chronic disease
- All people have appropriate places to obtain medical and dental care
- Decrease disparities in life expectancy and chronic disease in Allegheny County



#### **Behavioral Health Goals**

- People have access to behavioral health services, including treatment for substance disorders
- People will participate in programs and activities that support mental health and well-being



#### **Enviornmental Health Goals**

- More people live in stable and safe housing
- Fewer people experience violence in their comes and communities
- More residents live in communities that are prepared to adapt to and absorb the impacts of climate change



## Putting it all together (Example #1)

- Goal 1: People of all ages engage in behaviors that promote physical health and reduce the risk of chronic disease
- **Objective 1.1:** More infants are fed human breastmilk
- Strategies:
  - Increase the number of trained lactation support professionals, especially people of color
- **Metric**: Increase human breastmilk feeding from 81.7% (2019) to 84% (2027). Source: PA Birth Certificate
- Partners: Organizations that support lactation services and education



## Putting it all together (Example #2)

- Goal 6: More people live in stable and safe housing
- Objective 6.2: Fewer people live in housing that does not meet health standards
- Strategies:
  - Update ACHD Article VI Housing and Community Environment
  - Support policies that reduce the amount of blighted and abandoned properties
  - Support policies that increase the availability of affordable and safe housing
- **Metric:** By 2027, increase compliance for abatement for complaint housing cases with Class 1 or Class 2 violations by 15% from 60% (2021) to 75% (2027) in compliance
- **Partners:** Housing Authority, Department of Human Services, municipal governments, housing advocacy organizations, area landlords





# **COVID-19 Vaccine Updates**

- Simplified mRNA COVID-19 vaccination schedule
  - Aligns more closely with influenza vaccination schedule
  - Monovalent no longer used (bivalent only)
- Children under 5 years old
  - 2-3 bivalent doses
- People 6 years and older
  - 1 bivalent dose
- People 65 years and older
  - 1 additional bivalent dose (4 months after first)
- Immunocompromised people
  - Update pending

# Ending the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency

- Public Health Emergency ending on May 11, 2023
  - Vaccines, testing and treatment coverage
    - Transition to traditional health care coverage
      - Details of CDC national vaccine program are pending (free for now)
      - May limit the ability for the CDC to provide no-cost testing
      - May reduce the number of sites offering testing
  - Data reporting
    - Potential for reduced data and frequency of reporting
      - Negative laboratory tests
      - Vaccine administration
      - Hospitalizations
    - Could change strategies used for prevention and mitigation



# PA DOH: Candida auris

- Candida auris (C. auris) infections
  - Yeast that can cause severe invasive illness and outbreaks in health care facilities
  - Resistant to multiple antifungal drugs
- Summary of event
  - C. auris first appeared in PA in 2020 and cases continue to increase
  - C. auris first detected in Allegheny County in 2022
- What to do?
  - Learn about C. auris infection and steps to prevent infection<sup>1</sup>
- ACHD
  - Investigation of all cases
  - Health care provider guidance, education and recommendations



# PA DOH: Lyme Disease and Tickborne Diseases

- Lyme disease
  - Most commonly reported tickborne disease in PA and U.S.
  - Caused by bacterium through bite of infected tick
  - Infection can spread to joints, heart and nervous system
- Summary of event
  - Tick bite-related emergency department visits have increased recently in PA
  - 2,380 Lyme disease and 20 anaplasmosis cases in Allegheny County in 2021
- What to do?
  - Prevent tick bites and remove ticks correctly
  - Learn about Lyme disease symptoms<sup>1</sup>
- ACHD
  - Surveillance of cases



# PA DOH: Hepatitis A

- Hepatitis A
  - Vaccine-preventable, short-term liver infection
  - Spread through close contact with infected person or eating contaminated food/drink
- Summary of event
  - Since 2017 multiple states (including PA) have experienced large hepatitis A outbreaks
  - 5 Hepatitis A cases in Allegheny County in 2020, 1 in 2021, 1 in 2022
- What to do?
  - Stay up to date with Hepatitis A vaccines
    - Children and people with risk factors (ex. experiencing homelessness, use drugs, men who have sex with men)
  - Learn about Hepatitis A symptoms<sup>1</sup>
- ACHD
  - Investigation of all cases
  - Vaccination of close contacts and at Immunization Clinic

# WIC Program Highlights

- Infrastructure Funds (\$810K)
  - Administrative and downtown offices moved -2020, WIC waiting room upgrades - partnership with the Children's Museum
- UPMC WIC Satellites Two UPMC locations will offer WIC services, summer 2023.
  - Magee and Primary Care Center Pediatrics
- WIC Mobile Clinic Public Health Improvement Fund Grant (\$294K) - Increase WIC accessibility in communities with low utilization rates and number of families participating
  - Tarentum, Duquesne, Homestead, North Side, Millvale, South Hills, Mt. Oliver
- Giant Eagle Mobile Unit WIC approved












# Breastfeeding

- Breastfeeding Incidence 65%
  - Black participants were less likely to breastfeed exclusively, or partially, than other racial/ethnic populations
  - The rates for Black participants are low despite accounting for 43% of WIC population in Allegheny County

# Proposed Article VI Update and Public Comment Period

#### Introduction

- Article VI gives authority to inspect and enforce minimum property standards and public health requirements for dwellings and premises
- Proposing first revision to Article VI since 1997
- Update is necessary to:
  - Align county housing standards with other jurisdictions
  - Promote better understanding and readability for landlords and tenants
  - Improve safety standards to reduce and prevent injuries
  - Clarify roles tenants and landlords have in keeping dwellings safe and healthy



#### **Vote for Public Comment Period**

- Proposing 60-day public comment period
- Met with stakeholders on proposed updates and to encourage involvement in a public comment period
- If approved, staff will conduct a public hearing, compile public comments and responses into a document
- After considering public comments, ACHD will present a final Article VI draft to BOH during a future meeting for a "repeal/replace" vote



## **Categories of Proposed Changes**

- Administrative Updates: procedural updates, structural changes, explaining penalty notices and updates to permitting/plan review
- Modernizing Requirements: aligning with international codes and industry standards
- Improving Readability: increasing understanding around areas such as violation levels and habitability standard
- Improving Safety Standards: raising safety standards as prioritized in the Plan for a Healthier Allegheny, 2023-2027
- Clarifying Tenant and Landlord Responsibility: adding language specifying the role each play in maintaining safe, healthy dwelling places.



## **Administrative Updates**

- Related sections grouped under subchapters to assist in understanding.
   Penalty information was moved to the beginning, variance requests were moved to "General Requirements"
- More than 20 definitions added or updated to clarify requirements.
   Example: updating owner definition
- Section 607: Penalty Notice clarify that items listed are only required when a penalty is deemed appropriate
- Section 612: Requirements for Rooming House Permits
  - If a rooming house also requires a permit from our Food Safety Program, they will need separate permits and will pay separate plan review fees
  - In line with Article III update



# Modernizing Requirements: Aligning with Industry Standards

- Multiple sections adjusted to be in line with international codes and industry standards
  - Example: Section 646: Sloped ceilings one-third of the room ceiling height required to be 7 feet down from half the room
  - Aligns standards with IPMC
- Other areas of modernization include: distance to connection to public water supply, ventilation requirements, openable window requirements, required ratios of plumbing fixtures in rooming houses, and minimum square footage requirements



# **Improving Readability**

- Class violation levels are clearly defined
  - Currently program is restricted to classifying certain issues regardless of the circumstance, as defined in Section 615
- Clarifying the habitability standard: Revised the definition of dwelling or dwelling unit unfit for human habitation
  - Rather than adding up numbers of class violations, the standard is whether there exists a hazard to occupants or the public
- Section 651: Lead hazards: Clarifying minimum requirements for addressing lead issues, based on hazard category
  - All definitions in line with HUD and the Code of Federal Regulations



## Improving Safety Standards: Plan for a Healthier Allegheny

- Section 624: Openings
  - Deadbolts required on all entry doors, in line with IPMC
  - Fall prevention devices on all windows under 24 inches from the floor, in line with IRC
  - Openable windows must be secured to prevent sudden drops, in line with IPMC
- Section 626: Grading and drainage
  - Properties must be properly graded and drained to prevent erosion, landslides, and pooling water resulting in pests, in line with IPMC



# Improving Safety Standards: Electrical Outlet Safety and Sufficient Refuse Containers

- Section 630: Electric fixtures and outlets
  - Ground-fault circuit interrupter outlets required in all bathrooms
  - All accessible outlets must be GFCI protected within 6 feet of sink and on the exterior
  - In line with HUD and National Electrical Code
- Section 655: Facilities required
  - Owners must provide containers with sufficient capacity to store occupant's trash between scheduled collection times, in line with IPMC





#### Improving Safety Standards: Carbon Monoxide Detectors

- Section 643: Smoke and carbon monoxide detectors
  - Requiring CO detectors in line with the City of Pittsburgh, the Consumer Product Safety Commission and International Fire Code
  - Required in all dwellings with fuel burning appliances, ongoing renovations, fireplaces or attached garages
  - Must have detector on every floor (basements and cellars included)
  - Must be located in the vicinity of all sleeping areas
- According to the PA Department of Health there were 11 unintentional, non-fire related, CO deaths between 2016-2020 in Allegheny County
  - 110 throughout the commonwealth, during that same period



## 5) Tenant and Landlord Responsibility

- Section 638: Tenants, as well as landlords, share a responsibility to maintain a healthy, safe environment for themselves and neighbors
  - In policy and practice, HCE focuses on education and communication
  - Penalties are treated as a last resort
  - Changes will require tenants to:
    - Notify landlord of issues
    - Work with landlord to manage pests
    - Not create fire hazards
    - Store potentially dangerous materials safely
- Section 654: If tenant's actions in a multi-unit do not contribute to an infestation, owner is solely responsible. Owner remains responsible for all common areas and the exterior



## **Anticipated Timeline**

- May-July 2023: Public comment period
- July 2023: Hold public hearing
- July-August 2023: Review public comments and develop public comment response document
- August 2023: Incorporate public comments, as appropriate
- Fall 2023:Present final draft to BOH for approval
- Fall/Winter 2023: Send proposal to county council
- July 1, 2024: Effective date for new Article VI
