Director's Report

- Environmental Health
 - Virtual plumbing inspections going well, up to nearly 10 percent of inspections
 - Air Quality's permitting section continues to finalize development of online permitting portal (Regulated Entities Portal). Residents should have access by the end of the year
 - Air Quality's monitoring section relocated the Avalon monitor a few hundred yards from the old location and is preparing to relocate the Lawrenceville monitor to Fulton Street
 - Air Quality's enforcement section has worked to reduce the amount of unpaid or overdue invoices from \$113,624.59 to \$9,2670.



Director's Report

- Administration
- The budgeting process is wrapping up for 2024
- Submitted nine new grant applications over the last 3 months. Total grant applications totaling \$29 million with spending periods ranging from 3-5 years.
- Moving multiple programs from the Clack campus in Lawrenceville to Fulton Street, as well as relocating current programs into revamped spaces in their current leased facilities
- Public Health Laboratory
 - Work is underway in collaboration with County IT in developing process flows and specifications to identify and develop a new laboratory information system




Canadian wildfire smoke

- Two periods of Canadian wildfire smoke blanketed Allegheny County in June 2023
- On June 29, the AQI for $PM_{2.5}$ peaked at 212 at our Parkway East monitoring station
- This is the highest rolling AQI for PM_{2.5} recoded in Allegheny County
- An AQI of 212 falls in the "very unhealthy" range (Note: PM_{2.5} was not regulated until 1997 and AQI was not implemented until 1999, so that is how far data goes back)
- The highest AQI for PM_{2.5} recorded in the county until the recent Canadian wildfire event was about 175 and occurred in 2003
- ACHD kept residents apprised on changing air quality conditions and provided information on how they could remain healthy



Air Quality Over the Years





Environmental Health: Plan for Healthier Allegheny, 2023-2027

- Overarching goal: More people live in safe and resilient communities
- Air quality improvement
 - Reduce the annual average $PM_{2.5}$ concentration by at least 12% (from 9.7 μ g/m³ in 2021 to 8.5 μ g/m³ in 2027, on a countywide average basis)
 - Reduce the number of days per year when sulfur dioxide (SO2) exceeds an AQI of 50 (from 36 in 2021 to 26 in 2027)
- Communities prepared to adapt to changes generated from climate change
- Housing stability and quality
- Violence reduction

Mpox

- Background
 - Virus mostly spread by intimate contact with mild symptoms, but can be severe
 - Antiviral treatment and vaccine available
- Impact in Allegheny County
 - Mpox first detected in Allegheny County in June 2022 (no cases since December 2022)
 - Concern for possible resurgence in summer 2023
- Steps residents can take
 - Learn about mpox symptoms and steps to prevent infection¹
 - Get vaccinated, if high risk
- ACHD's role
 - Testing and vaccination at clinics
 - Investigation of all cases
 - Health care provider coordination, guidance and recommendations



Syphilis

- Background
 - Treatable bacterial infection spread through sex or from mother to baby
 - Can cause severe disease if untreated or in babies (congenital syphilis)
- Impact in Allegheny County
 - 2022 PA had highest early and congenital syphilis cases since 1990 (rise in reproductive age females)
 - 2021 Allegheny County had 328 early syphilis cases (infection < 1 year)
- Steps residents can take
 - Learn about syphilis symptoms, risk of infection, and steps to prevent infection¹
 - Talk to health care provider about testing (pregnant or people at risk for other STIs)
- ACHD's role
 - Testing and treatment at STI/HIV clinic
 - Investigation of all cases
 - Health care provider guidance and recommendations



Rabies and Animal Bites

- Background
 - Fatal, but preventable, viral disease spread to people and pets if bitten/scratched by rabid animal
 - Mostly from wild animals like bats, raccoons, skunks and foxes
- Impact in Allegheny County
 - 1-2 human rabies cases per year in U.S. (no cases in Pennsylvania since 1984)
 - 2,258 animal bite reports in 2021
- Steps residents can take
 - Learn more about rabies¹
- ACHD's role
 - Investigation of all reported animal bites
 - Rabies testing at Public Health Laboratory
 - Rabies baiting
 - Education and recommendations for residents and health care providers following possible exposure



West Nile Virus

- Background
 - Leading mosquito-borne disease in U.S. and Pennsylvania
 - Mostly causes no symptoms, but can cause severe disease
 - Usually occurs July to Sept
- Impact in Allegheny County
 - First positive mosquitos of 2023 in PA were identified in May during routine monitoring
 - Three West Nile Virus cases in Allegheny County in 2021, one case in 2022
- Steps residents can take
 - Learn more about West Nile Virus¹
 - Eliminate and treat mosquito breeding sites
- ACHD's role
 - Investigation of all cases
 - Treatment of stormwater basins to prevent mosquito breeding



COVID-19

- Background
 - Caused by contagious respiratory virus (SARS-CoV-2) with minor symptoms, but can be severe
 - Antiviral treatment and vaccine available
- Impact in Allegheny County
 - 370 deaths in PA in past three months due to COVID-19
 - Bivalent booster rate disparities in Allegheny County White 21.4%, Black 13.4% (17% entire US)
- Steps residents can take
 - Stay up to date with COVID-19 recommendations¹
 - Get a booster shot, if eligible
- ACHD's role
 - Vaccination at clinics
 - Testing at Public Health Laboratory
 - Investigation of cases in 65 years and older
 - Skilled nursing facility guidance, education and recommendations
 - CDC's Community Health Workers for COVID Response and Resilient Communities (CCR) grant



Canadian Wildfire Smoke/Air Quality Alerts

- Background
 - Fine particulate matter (PM2.5) is the main component of concern from wildfire smoke
 - PM2.5 exposure can cause serious lung and heart effects
- Impact in Allegheny County
 - PA Health Alert Network released an air quality alert related to wildfires in Canada on June 7
 - Allegheny County reported two days of "unhealthy"/"very unhealthy" Air Quality Index (AQI) and five days of "unhealthy for sensitive groups" in June
 - AQI peaked at 212 at ACHD's Parkway East monitoring station (highest rolling AQI for PM2.5 ever recorded in Allegheny County since AQI was implemented in 1999)
- Steps residents can take
 - Learn about the AQI and how to reduce exposure¹
- ACHD's role
 - Air quality monitors
 - Air quality alerts











2008-2022 Overdose Deaths

Current Trends in Illicit Drug Supply

- Fentanyl is still the primary driver of the overdose epidemic
 - Most common analogues: acetyl fentanyl, para-fluorofentanyl and furanyl fentanyl
- Emerging threat of Xylazine
 - A study in Philadelphia in 2021 showed 90 percent of opioid samples contained Xylazine
 - The ACHD has begun distribution of Xylazine test strips













2008-2022 Drug Combinations in Overdose Deaths






2008-2022 Drug Combinations in Overdose Deaths by Race








Naloxone distribution (2022)

- Naloxone distributed to 264 different organizations
- •13,991 kits distributed
 - More than 65% distributed to target areas identified by hot-spot analysis
 - 6,118 to treatment/recovery and harm reduction organizations
 - 831 to social service agencies
 - 1,292 to non-traditional first responders, such as schools, churches, small businesses and nonprofits
 - 2,293 to traditional first responders






Naloxone Distribution and Connection to Care

- In 2022, hosted more than 200 trainings/events and distributed almost 14,000 kits of Narcan
- Trained more than 7,092 people to administer Narcan
- Will receive 22,000 kits from PCCD over the next year
- Supported more than 425 referrals for connection to treatment (MOUD) in 2022
- Partners include Team PSBG, Bridge Outreach, HSAO,
 Squirrel Hill Health Center and others



2016-2023 Q1 Suboxone Prescribing




*Suboxone prescriptions only include those dispensed at a pharmacy
