Organizational Experience (15 points possible)

1. Describe your organizational experience providing OST Programming or programming that works with youth and families.

Bible Center Church - The Oasis Project (BCC-TOP) provides high-quality out-of-school-time programming for school-aged children in Homewood and nearby neighborhoods. TOP's four foci are Education, Employment, Entrepreneurship, and the built Environment. The year-round education programs at TOP are The Maker's Clubhouse (TMC) and Oasis Farm and Fishery (OFF). TMC is a high-quality after-school program that offers students in grades K-5 daily homework help/tutoring, a meal, and STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Agriculture, and Math) enrichment activities. TMC also hosts community science days, Dream STEAM each January and Green STEAM each April, to give children a full day of science enrichment on two school vacation days. TMC also sponsors STEAM-focused assemblies for the entire school body at both Faison and Lincoln Elementary Schools. OFF is an educational urban farm located in Homewood that incorporates traditional agriculture with hydroponics and aquaponics. OFF offers community groups and schools educational tours and workshop programs that teach participants the importance of food literacy, nutrition, cooking skills, and urban gardening basics. OFF's Better Food Better Me (BFBM) program teaches school-aged children where their food comes from, and how to grow, harvest, and prepare fresh produce for healthy meals and snacks. In addition, the two programs coordinate to hold a 7-week summer camp entitled Green STEAM & Play, which combines outdoor activities including gardening with engaging academic units to help ameliorate summer learning loss.

BCC-TOP has operated afterschool and summer programming for over a decade in the Homewood community. Our afterschool program, The Maker's Clubhouse (TMC), began eleven years ago at Pittsburgh Public School's (PPS) Faison Elementary. We expanded the program to PPS's Lincoln Elementary school three years ago. The annual summer camp, Green STEAM and Play (GS&P) has been in operation for seven years.

Cynthia Wallace EdD earned her doctorate from the University of Pittsburgh and serves as the Executive Director of The Oasis Project. She works closely with program staff, schools, and partners to maintain and develop responsive and high-quality programming. India Harris, BA is the manager of Bible Center's educational programs. She has extensive experience in school-age and early childhood programs and holds a State of Pennsylvania Director's Credential.

2. Describe your organizational experience working in high-need communities, especially the community(ies) you are proposing to serve.

Bible Center Church (BCC) was founded and led by Ralph and Bernice Groce from 1956 to 2003. In 2004, the Groce's grandson, Dr. John Wallace returned to Pittsburgh, and with his wife, Dr. Cynthia Wallace, assumed leadership of BCC. Beginning in 2008, they helped to launch, and/or lead, several prominent initiatives focused on the economic mobility of low-income children and families in and around Homewood (i.e., Homewood Children's Village, Operation Better Block, Pitt Assisted Communities and Schools, Homewood Community Ministries, the Everyday Café, Pitt's Homewood Community Engagement Center, and the Own Our Own Entrepreneurial Center). They launched The Oasis Project (TOP), the community and economic development division of BCC, in 2011 to promote the positive development of Homewood and to address the tremendous disparities in opportunities and outcomes for young people that exist in the city of Pittsburgh.

TOP's mission is to create oases—places of peace, safety, and happiness in the midst of difficulty. TOP uses education, employment, entrepreneurship, and improvements in the physical environment to promote the economic mobility of low-income people. TOP's vision is that all people in its target communities will have the opportunity to flourish.

Since 2011 we have focused our education work on our after-school and summer programs through The Maker's Clubhouse and Oasis Farm and Fishery. Each provides high-quality STEAM-focused programs that simultaneously educate elementary school students, employ and train young adults, and support working families.

Bible Center Church - The Oasis Project (BCC-TOP) provides high-quality out-of-school-time programming for school-aged children in Homewood and nearby neighborhoods through afterschool programs at PPS's Faison and Lincoln elementary and a seven-week summer day camp featuring environmental and STEAM learning.

Providing a safe space for students is a priority and a measured objective of our out-of-schooltime programming. We have prioritized social-emotional learning lessons in our curriculum and for the past few years have had masters-level social work interns work with students and parents in our program. TOP's education staff handbook addresses creating a safe space and staff regularly review best practices for interacting with children and metrics for assessing the children's level of security. TOP program staff recognize that establishing a culture of possibilities among the students is imperative to ensuring a safe environment for the children to explore and grow. TMC staff follow PPS building policies to ensure a safe afterschool environment. Green STEAM and Play and day-long enrichment programs are held on the Bible Center campus where building security and safety guidelines are well established and followed. TOP out-of-school-time programs are focused on STEAM (science, technology, engineering, agriculture, and math, and incorporate social-emotional learning (SEL). We highlight agriculture (as opposed to the traditional 'art') because the skills and knowledge are life-sustaining and empowering. Agricultural education is also readily accessible because of our farm and fishery. We partner with several different organizations to supplement our STEAM learning, diversify our SEL offerings, and offer different curricula such as environmental activities or physical

fitness and healthy eating lessons. The choice to be STEAM-focused was in part a response to an assessment that science classes were limited at Faison elementary. In addition, the STEAM career fields are and will continue to be extremely important in our society, and our goal is to ensure the children from Homewood have equitable access to these opportunities. SEL was incorporated because it is important for children to have strong self-esteem, an understanding of their emotions, skills to problem solve and express their feelings. Some children in our program have experienced trauma and challenges in their community and/or home-life, so teaching skills and providing tools to work through and understand their emotions is critical to positively impacting their life trajectory. Students are surveyed about their interest in various content, and our program managers and staff create the curriculum by accessing a variety of open-source materials.

The afterschool program has two grade groups (i.e., K-2nd and 3rd -5th). In addition to homework help and other activities, the students have a weekly lesson with STEM Coding Lab, a STEAM lesson and lab, Better Food-Better Me, and social-emotional learning. We began a partnership with Sylvan Learning Center in the summer of 2021 with the goal begin for all children to have targeting tutoring weekly.

The program curriculum aims to develop an atmosphere of positive connections among all participants (students, staff, and partners). SEL lessons prioritize positive interactions between a student and their peers, and with other community members. Additionally, as a majority of the STEAM-based activities are group-focused, students have ample opportunity to work with others.

TOP staff participate in professional development (PD) multiple times throughout the year in order to establish a strong understanding of the program's policies and procedures. During the school year, staff participate in one week of PD before the start of the term programming in September and January. In addition to the two PD weeks, various training sessions are held on days that PPS is not open. Over the summer, staff participate in one week of PD before the start of GS&P. These opportunities ensure staff are aware of the expectations for all aspects of the program. Additionally, these trainings help develop staff abilities to have positive interactions with the students. Students are surveyed about their positive connections with the staff, and any lack of connection. These data inform staff training and program development pertaining to students' connection and culture-building techniques.

Students that live and learn in Homewood and surrounding neighborhoods are the primary beneficiaries of BCC-TOP out-of-school-time programs. Students who attend Faison and Lincoln Elementary are eligible to attend The Maker's Clubhouse afterschool program. These students are in grades kindergarten through 5th and between the ages of 5 and 11. These schools are considered Pittsburgh's most racially segregated (97% African American population) and economically challenged (86% free/reduced-price lunch) per PPS enrollment data. In addition to offering TMC during the school year, we offer Green STEAM & Play for 7 weeks

In addition to offering TMC during the school year, we offer Green STEAM & Play for 7 weeks in the summer. This program is offered to students enrolled in The Maker's Clubhouse, but also to elementary and middle school students in Homewood and surrounding neighborhoods. The students enrolled in GS&P are predominantly African American. Students at the camp mostly come from Homewood or the neighborhoods nearby including Larmier, Lincoln-Lemington, and East Hills. Homewood is 92% African American according to the 2010 Census so the majority of students enrolled in the program are as well.

BCC-TOP is located in Homewood and serves Homewood and nearby communities to create opportunities for economic mobility for marginalized and underserved children and families.

Providing high-quality out-of-school-time programs in and for these communities is a key method to changing the life trajectory for these children.

Youth and Parent Experience (10 points)

4. Why do you think youth will want to participate in your OST Programming? Provide specific methods you will use to ensure that they remain engaged and interested in your Programming. Student voice is a key component of our program. We give students interest surveys and conduct focus groups in each program session to determine what program participants are interested in and would like to do in our program. In addition, specific programming like our Better Food Better Me program administered by Oasis Farm and Fishery conducts pre-and post-testing. Student responses and results help staff understand the student experience, and assess the interest in the topic based on subject retention. Students rate their feelings on a scale of 1 (not agree) to 5 (always agree). Two key questions are 1)"I feel like I am learning new things at TMC" and 2)"I feel like it is easy to pay attention to the activities". Recent survey results for these two questions have average rates of 4.33 and 4.03 respectively. At the start of the 2021-2022 school year, students were asked who in their life they feel they can turn to talk about emotions or things going on in their life. TMC staff members were listed in many of the responses as primary or secondary persons.

Frequent surveys ensure the quality of our programs remains high and meets TOP goals. If aggregated results indicate students are not having a positive experience, TMC staff will reflect, seek programming guidance through research or mentorship and implement programmatic adjustments.

5. Describe your approach to communicating with parents/caregivers. Provide specific methods you will use to ensure that parents/caregivers feel comfortable with your OST Programming and confident that their child is safe and well cared for.

It is a high priority of TMC to ensure that our program is accessible to parents/caregivers as greater parental/caregiver involvement and confidence are proven to positively impact the student's experience. Therefore, a clear line of communication with the students' parents/caregivers is critical to achieving our programmatic goals around student achievement. We use multiple communications methods to engage parents/caregivers. We conduct a pre-start date orientation for students and their parents/caregivers. This allows the families to meet the staff and learn the program guidelines, policies, and expectations. Staff gain a better understanding of some of the challenges the families might be facing and how they prefer to communicate. Site managers share their professional contact information with the parents/caregivers to help with child-specific questions. During the afterschool programming period (i.e. school-year) we utilize TextinChurch software to send broadcast messages to include program highlights, reminders, and closure notifications. We also have family-focused social media on Facebook and Instagram where we share childcare and educational insights and news about happenings (@makersclubhouse). Professional Development sessions review these methods and make updates according to new technology and parent/caregiver feedback. Staff and program interns also conduct wellness checks with families at least monthly to receive program feedback and also to determine if there are family needs or barriers to school attendance or achievement.

Operations (20 points)

For afterschool programming, we work with school leadership and faculty at our partner schools for referrals and to engage families in our program. The summer Green Steam & Play program is promoted to local schools, churches, and community organizations. We utilize flyers, websites (www.makersclubhouse.com), and social media advertising, in addition to a strong word-of-
- promoted to local schools, churches, and community organizations. We utilize flyers, websites (www.makersclubhouse.com), and social media advertising, in addition to a strong word-of-mouth network. Dr. Wallace, our program manager, and staff maintain consistent relationships with school leaders via email, visits, and other networking opportunities.
- 7. Describe how you will staff your Programming and the strategies you will use to recruit, hire and retain racially diverse staff, staff with relevant lived experience and staff that reflect the population served.
- BCC-TOP posts open positions on job boards (i.e., Indeed and Non-Profit Talent, Handshake) and our social media pages across our five programs and the Bible Center. We also share openings with partner organizations and schools, and our parents/caregivers. As a result, we have consistently had a diverse staff with a significant number of people who look like the children in our program. We prioritize professional development and competitive wages as we believe that this contributes to staff retention as individuals see that they are valued and how their role contributes to the overall mission of the organization.
- 8. Provide the hours and days you expect your OST program to operate during the school year and summer.

TMC afterschool will operate from September 12, 2022, to May 31, 2023. The program operates Monday through Friday from 3:00 PM to 6:00 PM. We follow Pittsburgh Public School's schedule which may have delayed starts or closures that affect afterschool programming. We expect to operate our program 144 school days.

Green STEAM & Play summer session is from June 27 to August 12, 2022. The program is Monday through Friday from 8:00 AM to 3:00 PM. The program will operate for 7-weeks (34 days).

9. Describe your plan for storing and providing healthy snacks and meals during the school year and summer.

TMC afterschool is provided with refrigerators at both elementary schools where we operate. The school staff are responsible for managing the snacks and meals. TMC staff distribute and count the number of meals and snacks consumed each day. The summer program has two reachin refrigerators and a milk cooler on-site at Bible Center. The three refrigerators hold multiple days' worth of student meals and snacks.

Implementation Challenges (20 points possible)

10. If your Program experiences low attendance, how will you engage more youth? We review student surveys, parent feedback, and pre-/post- testing data to inform enhancements to programs. This might include expanded transportation services, additional tutoring time, new program providers, or more featured lessons.

If we experience low attendance in the afterschool program we will consult with the school leadership to assess possible scheduling challenges or to assist us in promoting the program to new families.

In the summer program, we promote the program to reach capacity enrollment prior to the start date. If attendance drops off, we will assess external and internal conditions that may be affecting attendance and work to resolve programming and access issues.

- 11. If a youth in your Program experiences behavioral or mental health issues, what will you do? Maintaining open lines of communication with the students, their parents/caregivers, and the school counselor and social worker is key to addressing behavioral and mental health issues. We encourage the children to talk with our staff about issues affecting their wellbeing. If an instance occurs or concerning behavior is observed we work with school leadership, our faculty, and families to support the child's wellness. Our staff is trained to identify signs of trauma and will abide by mandated reporter laws if appropriate.
- 12. If the results of the bi-annual parent survey indicate that parents are not satisfied with the experience of their children in your Program, what will you do? The initial response will be to analyze the data to determine if there are specific areas where the majority of parents/caregivers are dissatisfied. If this is the case, we can look at possible program modifications. For example, in the early years of our program, we did not offer Homework help. Our parents complained that their children arrived home late and that starting homework was difficult. We modified our program to offer Homework help. If there are individual parents who express dissatisfaction, individual calls or meetings are scheduled to address concerns and hopefully resolve the issue. If survey results do not include adequate feedback to fully understand where we are not meeting their satisfaction, every effort will be made to gain more insight into the issues. These methods might include follow-up/more proactive surveys,

parent/caregiver group meetings, and one-on-one communications.

Lincoln Elementary, currently, provides afterschool students with an activities bus. If this service is suspended we will work with the school to begin providing transportation. If a family has a need that none of these options can resolve we will work with that family to research additional options.

DHS Review Committee:

I am writing on behalf of the Homewood Children's Village in support of Bible Center Church's proposal to the Department of Human Services to support their OST programming.

HCV has partnered with Bible Center Church (BC) in many different ways since 2012 and their OST programming has become an integral part of our "Cradle to Career" pipeline for Homewood youth. BC and Maker's Clubhouse staff participate in our community schools partner meetings for both Faison and Lincoln and contribute to the goals for each school. Additionally, BC has always been involved in collaborative OST work in Homewood, at one time even co-leading HOST (Homewood Out of School Time) meetings with HCV for several years.

While there are many afterschool and summer programs, not many are able to effectively balance the academic and educational enrichment with kids' need for play, joy, social-emotional development and an overall caring environment. The Maker's Clubhouse and Green STEAM and Play strike that balance. We consistently hear positive feedback from youth and parents about the program and often make referrals to new families looking for programming.

HCV is committed to improving the lives of Homewood's children and reweaving the fabric of the community. We believe that it takes a village to create such change, and Bible Center and its OST programs are a critical part of that village.


