Minutes

1. 2020 Performance Evaluation Tool

As part of the annual HUD CoC Program application the CoC needs to submit a rank-order list of projects. Since 2017, the CoC used a data-driven performance evaluation tool to rank renewal projects, and each year the CoC Analysis and Planning Committee has made recommendations to update the tool. The Committee completed their recommendation and it was sent to the CoC for public comment—no comments were received.

2020 Performance Evaluation Tool for HUD CoC Program Review and Ranking was approved.

2. COVID-19 Response/Updates

The remainder of the meeting was used to provide updates regarding the response to COVID-19. Below is key information and resources shared through the discussion. In addition to these COVID response items, DHS's Bureau of Homeless Services noted that other homeless service and support operations are working to keep business as usual: Allegheny Link is continuing to do referrals, no homeless service programs have shut down, and all are continuing to take referrals.

Additionally, special thanks was extended to the provider staff enabling the continuation of services. In particular, the burden being carried by emergency shelter staff was recognized and enough gratitude cannot be expressed to these staff members. In recognizing these efforts, it is of note that there is a substantial need for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and DHS will welcome any connections that can help get equipment to provider agencies.

- The Coronavirus Relief Bill passed on Friday and the Housing Alliance of Pennsylvania is

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seeking information to better understand how the COVID-19 pandemic is impacting low-income and housing insecure populations and the organizations that serve them, so that they may advocate for an effective use of funds to meet the needs of these populations and services. Feedback is being requested through Friday, April 3rd via a 5-minute, online survey: survey-link

- Local philanthropies have partnered to create the Emergency Action Fund, which will award operating grants on a rolling basis to emergency service providers and nonprofit organizations serving on the front lines of recovery. The Fund has two parts, the first distribution of which was largely focused on supporting the isolation/quarantine facilities. The second, which can start being applied for on Wednesday, April 1st, will provide fund to small and medium size organizations addressing basic needs of people affected by COVID-19: https://pittsburghfoundation.org/emergencyactionfund

Updates

- Hygiene stations were set up at three camps, which include mobile bathrooms and handwashing stations
- Early and ongoing efforts have focused on identifying new facilities that would allow for sufficient isolation/quarantine for high risk individuals and those who become sick and are not able to safely quarantine at home.
 - Hotels were identified as the ideal solution as they would allow for individual rooms and bathrooms. Outreach done with hotels across the area, but many declined participation due to the individuals that would be served. However, an interested hotel has been identifying and DHS is working with them to plan necessary support, including food, security, laundry, etc.
 - Large barrier trying to work through is insurance, so DHS has been working
 with the County Solicitors Office to try to resolve insurance issues. This has
 been an identified barrier across the country, with some areas moving
 forward without insurance and others having the state self-insure.
 - Concurrently, DHS is gathering information from providers and HMIS to identify individuals/families that would be prioritized for these spaces.
 Currently the list is a little over 100 individuals. Additionally, DHS is planning the best approach to transporting individuals once the spaces are available, and likely approximately 10 people will be moved in each day.
 - In addition to planning the operational needs of the isolation/quarantine facilities, DHS is working across Offices to effectively support physical and mental health needs of the individuals.
- HUD has been flexible with program requirements, for example, not termination people from programs due to time limit in program being reached. A waiver speaking to the flexibility is expected in the coming days.

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- Another example of programmatic flexibility has been DHS's support of virtual inspections for landlords. With these inspections, landlords do the walkthrough and film the space. Additionally, document requirements are more flexibility with a focus on collecting the documentation that they are able to submit photographs of the documentation rather than hard copies needing to be in-hand. Multiple providers highlighted that they have been able to move individuals into permanent housing utilizing the virtual inspection process.
- Both the Allegheny County Housing Authority and Housing Authority of the City of Pittsburgh reported the buildings are being cleaned, and emergency work orders are being processed. New inspections are also moving forward, but annual inspections are being postponed for the ACHA.
- The URA launched an additional Housing Stabilization Program through the Housing Opportunity Fund. Within the first week, 500 inquiries were received, so the application process is being closed until the backlog of initial applications can be worked through.
- The URA is also collaborating with other funding partners (foundations, lenders, State, etc) around exploring emergency business assistance to support the survival of businesses.
- Medicare and CHIP disenrollment for time limit have been suspended.
- Within a few of the State and Federal relief packages have been changes to unemployment compensation (UC), including the removal of the week waiting period, allowing for self-employed for people in the "gig" economy, and increasing the UC weekly amount by \$600.
 - Of note, the UC system is experiences challenges adapting to the current needs (e.g., getting the technology needed to support the claims coming in), so there are some delays occurring.
